You will need:

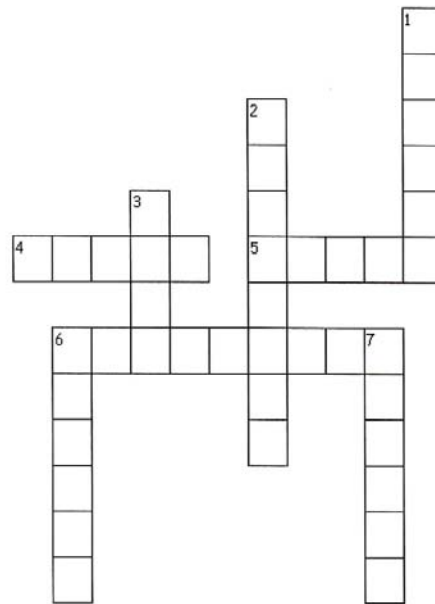
- 2 Oreos

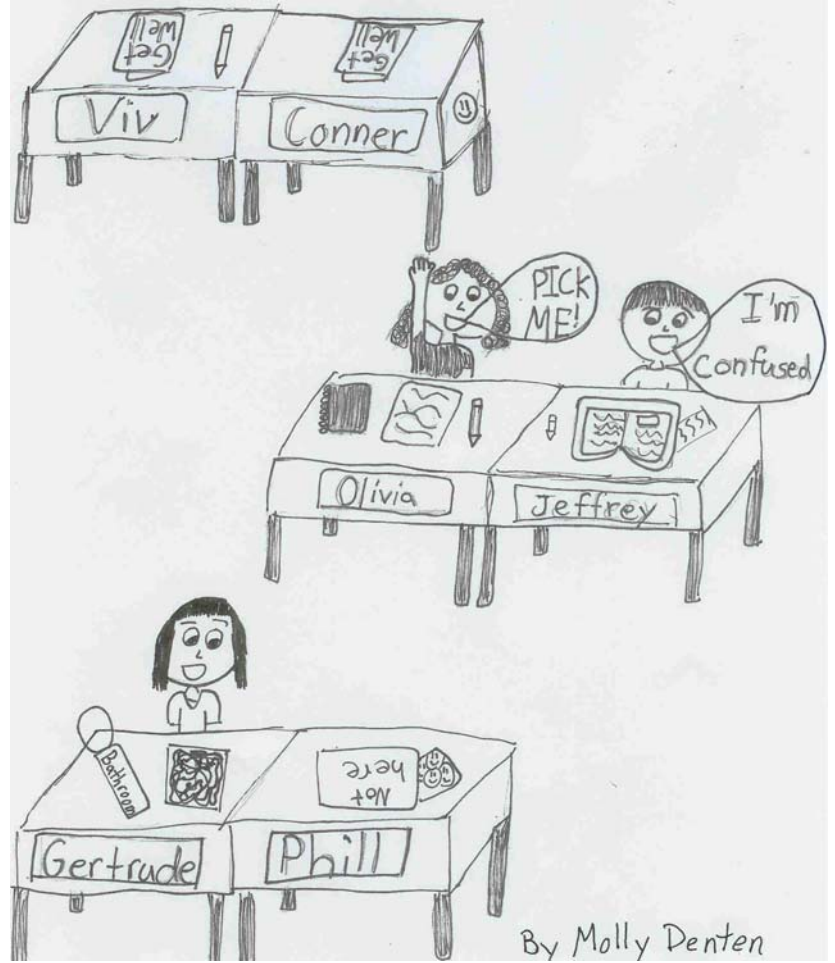

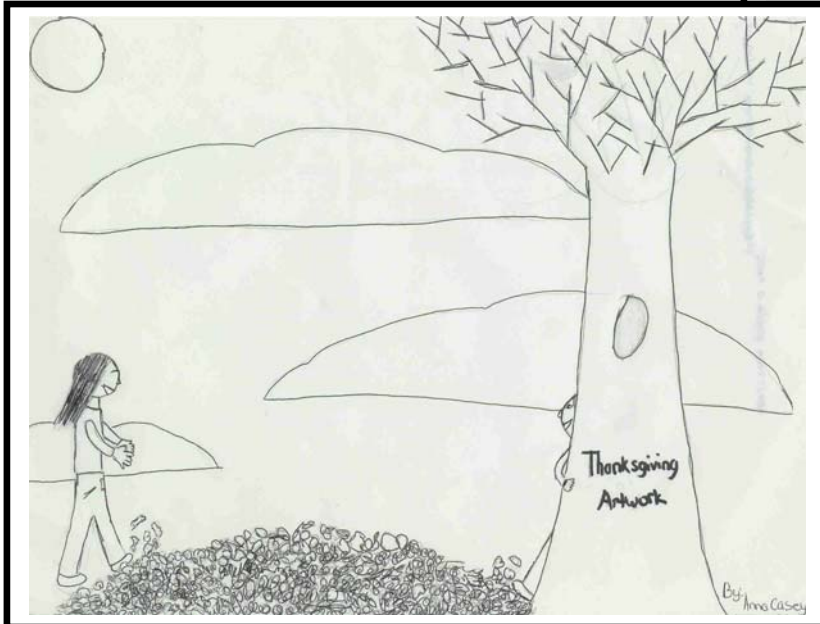
