

In his book, Joy of Love, Pope Francis writes that church leaders and members alike should look for new, creative ways to support those who are forced, whether by violence, job opportunities or poverty, to leave their homeland. The Parish Transformation initiative to spearhead action on a larger social issue dovetails beautifully with the Pope's call to action.

Last December 2016, a group was formed, including some St. Raymond parishioners, to support a family from Iraq. Funds from a donor provided furniture for the Nesery family and three months rent for the Marko family from Assyria who arrived in February. The Marko family was greeted by relatives and is not in need of additional support at this point.

The Nesery family now live in Skokie. Hamid Nesery and Suzan Lami have five children. Amjed, 29, Hawraa, 13, Reyam, 10, Hajer, 6, and Mohammed, 2. Hamid is currently looking for work and they are hopeful that Suzan may be able to care for Mohammed at home until he goes to school. Amjed is now working as a Lyft driver. Hawraa and Reyam are enrolled in grammar school and Hajer is in a Skokie District 68 pre-school. Hamid and Suzan are working diligently at studying English two days a week through School District 68. Suzan now has a sewing machine and fabric and is able to continue to sew clothes for herself and her three daughters.

Through Our Alms We Touch the World



"Our world is facing a refugee crisis of a magnitude not seen since the Second World War. This presents us with great challenges and many hard decisions. ..We must not be taken aback by their numbers, but rather view them as persons, seeing their faces and listening to their stories, trying to respond as best we can to their situation. To respond in a way which is always humane, just and fraternal, we need to avoid a common temptation nowadays: to discard whatever proves troublesome." -Pope Francis

A refugee is someone who is unable to return to his or her home country because of persecution due to race, religion, nationality, membership in a particular social group or political opinion. Many refugees struggle to establish themselves in a nation that is ambivalent about their presence. Cultural and linguistic differences and limited opportunities make it difficult for these newcomers to integrate, find work and support their families. They need culturally competent, supportive services to help them thrive in their new home.

The Refugee Resettlement Program of Catholic Charities of the Archdiocese of Chicago resettles more than 200 refugees each year. Upon arrival, a Program Case Manager helps guide refugees for up to two years through the process of adjusting to life in the United States. This includes:

- Securing housing and providing food, clothing, and household items;
- Applying for public benefits, Social Security cards, and State IDs;
- Scheduling required health screenings and addressing emergency health problems;
- Orienting them to public transportation;
- Developing family budgets;
- Enrolling the family in English classes;
- Providing cultural orientation;
- Ensuring children are enrolled in school;
- Helping parents understand the U.S. education system;
- Developing relationships with employers to assist in job placement for refugees

Refugee Resettlement Program

Overview

For more than 40 years, Catholic Charities has helped refugees resettle and call Chicago home. Each year we resettle more than 200 refugees. A refugee is someone who is unable to return to his or her home country because of persecution due to race, religion, nationality, membership in a particular social group or political opinion. Currently the world wide hot spots for refugees include: Syria, Democratic Republic of the Congo, Sudan, Somalia, Iraq, Afghanistan, and Myanmar (Burma).

You can help refugees by:

- Sponsoring all or part of a family's first three months of rent (\$5,000 with security deposit).
- Tutoring refugee parents and children in English, locating jobs for newly-arrived refugees, and teaching basic financial literacy to refugee families.
- Donating household items for a Refugee Welcome Pack, Ventra/CTA passes, gift cards, or apartment furnishings.

How Refugees Come to Chicago

1. United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees provides support and begins the process for resettlement.
2. Refugee participates in multiple lengthy security screenings.
3. U.S. State Department reviews the cases and distributes them to one of nine authorized resettlement agencies, agencies, including the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB).
4. USCCB assigns refugees to Catholic Charities Refugee Resettlement Programs throughout the country.
5. International Organization for Migration helps with transportation for the refugee to move to the U.S.
6. Catholic Charities Refugee Resettlement welcomes refugee families assigned to them.

Life in Chicago

When refugees arrive, one of our Case Managers will guide them through the process of adjusting to life in the U.S. for up to two years. This includes:

- Securing housing and providing food, clothing, and household items;
- Applying for public benefits, Social Security cards, and State IDs;
- Scheduling required health screenings and addressing emergency health problems;
- Orienting them to public transportation;
- Developing family budgets;
- Enrolling the family in English classes;
- Providing cultural orientation;
- Ensuring children are enrolled in school and helping parents understand the U.S. education system;
- Developing relationships with employers to assist in job placement for refugees

Loyalty and Patriotism Revisited

In a recent article in America magazine, Grant Kaplan, commenting on the challenge of the resurrection, makes this comment: *“Unlike previous communities in which the bond among members forges itself through those it excludes and scapegoats, the gratuity of the resurrection allows for a community shaped by forgiven-forgivers.”*

What he is saying, among other things, is that mostly we form community through demonizing and exclusion, that is, we bond with each other more on the basis of what we are against and what we hate than on the basis of what we are for and hold precious. The cross and the resurrection, and the message of Jesus in general, invite us to a deeper maturity within which we are invited to form community with each other on the basis of love and inclusion rather than upon hatred and demonization.

How do we scapegoat, demonize, and exclude so as to form community with each other? A number of anthropologists, particularly Rene Girard and Gil Bailie, have given us some good insights on how scapegoating and demonization worked in ancient times and how they work today.

In brief, here’s how they work: Until we can bring ourselves to a certain level of maturity, both personal and collective, we will always form community by scapegoating. Imagine this scenario: A group of us (family or colleagues) are going to dinner. Almost always there will be some divisive tensions among us – personality clashes, jealousies, wounds from the past, and religious, ideological, and political differences. But these can remain under the surface and we can enjoy a nice dinner together. How? By talking about other people whom we mutually dislike, despise, fear, or find weird or particularly eccentric. As we “demonize” them by emphasizing how awful, bad, weird, or eccentric they are, our own differences slide wonderfully under the surface and we form bonds of empathy and mutuality with each other. By demonizing others we find commonality among ourselves. Of course, you’re reluctant to excuse yourself and go to the bathroom, for fear that, in your absence, you might well be the next item on the menu.

Moreover, we do that too in our individual lives to maintain balance. If we’re honest, we probably all have to admit the tendency within us to steady ourselves by blaming our anxieties and bad feelings on someone else. For example: We go out some morning and for various reasons feel out of sorts, agitated and angry in some inchoate way. More often than not, it won’t take us long to pin that uneasiness on someone else by, consciously or unconsciously, blaming them for our bad feeling. Our sense is that except for that person we wouldn’t be feeling these things! Someone else is blame for our agitation! Once we have done this we begin to feel bet-

ter because we have just made someone else responsible for our pain. As a colorful commentary on this, I like to quote a friend who submits this axiom: *If the first two people you meet in the morning are irritating and hard to get along with, there’s a very good chance that you’re the one who’s irritating and hard to get along with.*

Sadly we see this played out in the world as a whole. Our churches and our politics thrive on this. Both in our churches and in our civic communities, we tend to form community with our own kind by demonizing others. Our differences do not have to be dealt with, nor do we have to deal with the things within ourselves that help cause those differences, because we can blame someone else for our problems. Not infrequently church groups bond together by doing this, politicians are elected by doing this, and wars are justified and waged on this basis – and the rich, healthy concepts of loyalty, patriotism, and religious affiliation then become unhealthy because they now root themselves in seeing differences primarily as a threat rather than seeing them as bringing a fuller revelation of God into our lives.

Granted, sometimes what’s different does pose a real threat, and that threat has to be met. But, even then, we must continue to look inside of ourselves and examine what in us might be complicit in causing that division, hatred, or jealousy, which is now being projected on us. Positive threat must be met, but it is best met the way Jesus met threats, namely, with love, empathy, and forgiveness. Demonizing others to create community among ourselves is neither the way of Jesus nor the way of human maturity. Loyalty to one’s own, loyalty to one’s religion, loyalty to one’s country, and loyalty to one’s moral values must be based upon what is good and precious within one’s family, community, religion, country, and moral principles, and not on fear and negative feelings towards others.

The lesson in Jesus, especially in his death and resurrection, is that genuine religion, genuine maturity, genuine loyalty, and genuine patriotism lie in letting ourselves be stretched by what does not emanate from our own kind

Pentecost

Easter time, of course, begins with the feast of Easter itself and lasts for 50 days, ending with Pentecost (Greek *pente* 'koste: "fiftieth") and it's this feast we celebrate next week. We need to understand it in the context of the Jewish feast *Shavout*, also called the Feast of Weeks, a full season of seven weeks of thanksgiving beginning with Passover Sabbath. It's a festival that celebrated the theme of harvest and thanksgiving, or the "first fruits" of the spring planting.



By the end of the second century, Christians were observing a similar 50-day festival of rejoicing after the annual *Pascha* (Easter). People prayed and fasting was prohibited. Most likely, the early followers of Jesus continued to observe the Jewish festival with the "first fruits" theme, rather than a distinctly new theme. Fasting and kneeling were forbidden because of the joyful experience of the resurrection.

By the late 4th century, the feast of the Ascension was celebrated in some parts of the church on the 40th day after Easter. Originally, this feast of the ending of Jesus' visible presence among his followers seems to have been observed as part of the outpouring of the spirit on the 50th day. In many dioceses of the United States, including ours, the Feast of the Ascension has been moved to Sunday and replaces the 7th Sunday of Easter.

The weekdays between Ascension and Pentecost are a preparation period for the outpouring of the Spirit upon the first community of those who believed that Jesus was the Lord and Christ. Therefore, the feast of Pentecost celebrates the "first fruits of the Holy Spirit", the beginning and flowering of the Church and its mission through the ongoing work of the Holy Spirit. It was and is visible and tangible like Christ's Body! We continue to build up the Church through the ongoing power of the Spirit. Jesus' Spirit draws near and raises up ministers and leaders to continue in this work. We pray for those who work in the Lord's vineyard as liturgical ministers, catechists, advocates for the poor and displaced, parents and young people who continue to discern God's call to serve others.

In many European countries the day of rejoicing marked by sharing in the bounty of what the earth has brought forth, creating festive wreaths with spring grasses and flowers. Many share this day by eating foods that have come forth from the earth. In this part of the world it is the strawberry or apricot. So today share in the joy of the Holy Spirit that has yielded many splendid gifts and fruits. Taste and see the goodness of the Lord! Psalm 34

Jesus, Head of the Church

When St. Perpetua was facing martyrdom, a guard taunted her by asking how she was ever going to endure the suffering. She responded, "At that moment, another will suffer within me." Perpetua believed that she and Christ were one. Christ has chosen to be united with us, the Church, so that we are identified with him. Even our word *church* has its roots in the Greek *Kyriake*, which means "what belongs to the Lord." The *Catechism* explains that the Church "lives from him, in him, and for him; he lives with her and in her" (807). The union of Christ and the Church is expressed well in the symbolism of a head and a body. A head directs a body. The body needs the head, but the head needs the body, too.

Jesus is supreme over all. Scripture says that God gave Jesus "as head over all things to the church, which is his body" (Ephesians 1:22-23). Jesus is head of the Church because of his primary role in our creation and our redemption. Jesus founded the Church. He brought forth the Church and gave it life through his death and resurrection. Tradition holds that the Church was born from the pierced heart of Christ on the cross.

Our union with Christ in the Church is called the Mystical Body. Christ loves and cares for the Church as his own body. Through the sacraments we are joined to Christ and to one another. We each have a role in building up the body and are given gifts to fulfill this role. The same Spirit that flowed through Christ flows through us, enabling us to help one another.

As Christ's Body, we share in his work. Through us, the Church, Christ continues the work of salvation. He speaks and acts through us. Through us, Christ shows forth the love of God for the human race. United with Jesus in his suffering, someday we will share his glory.

Jesus expressed our union with him this way: "I am the vine, you are the branches" (John 15:5). We draw forth our life from him, especially in Communion. He promised, "Whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood remains in me and I in him" (John 6:56). "We should grow in every way into him who is the head, Christ" (Ephesians 4:15). In other words, we should strive to resemble him.

At the end of time when Christ returns in glory, the Church will be perfected. Then we will be gathered in Christ in a love that never ends.

Learning Outside the Classroom



Registration for the Fall 2017-18 Religious Education year is now open!

It's that time of year again! Registration for the 2017-18 Religious Education Program is now open. We ask that all families at this time please complete all the necessary forms to ensure that your students will be registered. Registrations are due by July 31st! Registrations received August 1st and after will be assessed a \$50 late fee.

All registrations received on/after August 1st- students will be placed in a class IF there is room. Otherwise we will create a waiting list in the hopes we can find more volunteer Catechists. If we are unable to find Catechists for any remaining grades that need them, those students on the Waiting List will go into Home Study.

There are two parts to complete your registration:

- Completing the online registration form.
- Setting up a payment schedule Smart Tuition. *Families who do not set up a payment schedule via Smart Tuition (or pay in full by check) by July 31st will be assessed the \$50 Late Fee.*

Payment on Smart Tuition alone does not count as registration and will not reserve a space in class.




