

Here, our community continues to be immersed in various activities and projects.

# **Pardon our Dust**

You may have noticed the scaffold by the church tower. There is some work being done, specifically, repositioning the limestone tiles, tucking the capstones, and sealing the tower for winter. In the Fall of 2016 we noticed some wood ledges had fallen within the tower and had an evaluation. Various gaps had appeared along the window frames and large limestone plates. We are fixing this issue and a few others that need to be addressed (security fence in court yard, school doors etc.) at this time. These campus enhancements were needed and the money being used to pay for this work is from a reserve savings fund. This is not to be confused with the current capital campaign. Our campaign will begin very shortly and more details will be forthcoming.

As many of you know, we are without a business manager and in the process of searching for a candidate. The parish staff is currently maintaining our general daily operations and will continue in this fashion until the positon is filled.

This reminds us that the kind of encounter we offer can be transformative, fill others with a new direction and restoring dignity to the lives of people, and help them to know they are not alone in their struggles. 

# Through Our Alms We Touch the World



This week, parishes throughout the archdiocese will participate in a national collection to complete the final major project, the Trinity Dome, on the Basilica of the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception in Washington, DC before its 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary in 2020. Also known as America's Catholic Church, the National Shrine is the largest church in the United States and is a beacon of our faith to the nearly 1 million who visit it each year and to the millions more who visit and work in our nation's capital. # **VIATOR HOUSE OF HOSPITALITY**

Grounded in the Viatorian commitment to young people and to "those accounted of little importance," Viator House of Hospitality (VHH) provides compassionate accompaniment of young adult male undocumented immigrants released from federal detention. While Br. Michael Gosch, CSV worked with Interfaith Committee for Detained Immigrants (ICDI), he saw the need for a program for young men "aging out" of juvenile detention facilities for immigrants. VHH opened in January 2017 with the support of the Clerics of St. Viator and several northwest suburban communities of faith. Viator House of Hospitality provides a supportive living environment where these young men can attend school, grow spiritually and emotionally, receive medical attention, even work while they await court proceedings that determine if they can become U.S. citizens.

More than 200,000 children entered the U.S. between 2014 -2017 without adults as unaccompanied minors seeking protection from the despair of their homelands, 60,000 in 2015 alone. Through the Office of Refugee Settlement, these children are housed in juvenile detention facilities operated by licensed child-care providing agencies where they are cared for and given opportunities for education while they await the outcome of legal proceedings. Most children seek "asylum," which means they must prove they have a well-founded fear of persecution in their homeland. Unfortunately, nearly 60% of these children do not have attorneys to represent them at their hearing.

When these children turn 18, they are sent to adult detention facilities, which, in the Chicago area, are collar county jails where they might wait for months until their hearings. When Br. Gosch receives notice from a juvenile detention facility or a child's attorney, he and Sr. Rayo Cuaya-Castillo, the VHH case manager, interview each young man to see if VHH can meet his needs. VHH surrounds these young men with relationships and opportunities that help them discover their unique gifts and how to share them. VHH can welcome 20 young men to live at VHH and they can stay until it is determined that they can thrive on their own.

The Clerics of St. Viator have given Viator House of Hospitality a grant to support it financially for three years. VHH hopes to develop a strong donor base to finance this important ministry far into the future. If you want to help, please use the green Alms envelopes at the church entrances and note that the donation is for Viator House of Hospitality. The alms collection on the weekends of September 2/3 and 9/10 will be for VHH. VHH needs volunteers to tutor, cover shifts when no staff members can be present, provide rides and help in many other ways. Please contact Fr. ## My Faith Journey

It is impossible to talk about my faith journey, without also talking about the integral part several experiences at St. Raymond's played in building the foundation on which my life now stands.

My parents – Barb and Howard Bychowski- met and married at St. Raymond's, and my grandparents on both sides were early parishioners; continuing as parishioners in to the final years of their lives.

Growing up, St. Raymond's felt like an extension of home. It was the place where every family wedding, baptism and funeral took place. It was the place we celebrated every Easter and Christmas; and the place each Sunday we went to attend mass. It was where I had my first job – as evening receptionist in the PMC during high school- and where I began the most important relationship of my life; the one I have with God.

I can still clearly recall making my First Reconciliation, my First Communion and my Confirmation. Throughout each of these milestones, I could hear God's quiet voice telling me about Him, about the life He wanted for me. I went through many stages- like most of people do – when I struggled to believe; when I wasn't quite ready to accept the faith of my parent's as mine. But underneath it all, God continued to work in His way, to bring people and events in to my life that continued to steer me in His direction.

As I grew up, and eventually moved away from Mt. Prospect, I continued to lean on my faith as a source of support and encouragement. It wasn't easy to find a "new" St. Raymond's, but after a few years, I found a faith community that reminded me in several ways of the church I knew as home, and laid down new roots, now as an adult continuing to live my faith journey. Life has taken me in many directions – and many, many, (many) miles sometimes from where I started, but my story always starts at St. Raymond's, and I'm excited to share some of this journey with you.

# Pads with a Purpose

Did you know? Almost one million girls in Kenya will miss school this year because they have their period and lack the resources and information to manage this natural process?

With an aim of reaching at least 500 girls between the ages of 12 - 22, **Pads with a Purpose** seeks to accomplish two primary goals:

- 1) Provide a **source of encouragement** to these young women, through the creation and discussion of individual vision boards. Tools that the girls can use to put their dreams and goals onto paper, and in to action.
- 2) Provide **supplies to help the girls** maintain focus on their vision, including sanitary napkins, reproductive health education and school supplies.

#### Soko

Swahili for market, the "Soko" is a collection of goods, including jewelry and home goods, sourced from Kenya and surrounding countries.

All products are priced based on "suggested donation," basis with proceeds going to fund the Pads with a Purpose Project.

# The Back Story

I first went to Kenya in 2007, for a project at work. I had never been to Africa, and didn't know what to expect, but from the very beginning, I felt at home. From 2007 – 2008, I was based in Nairobi, Kenya and had the fortunate opportunity to also spend time in South Africa, Uganda, Tanzania and Ethiopia.

Determined to make it back, in 2011 I led a team of volunteers from Mississippi and Chicago on a ten-day Habitat for Humanity Build in Kenya. We worked with Kenyans who had been displaced after violence erupted following the 2007 elections, and who had been living in tented camps for close to 5 years. This experience brought together multiple parts of my life, and solidified in me a sense of passion and purpose in Africa.

Since that time, I have led three more Habitat for Humanity Builds in Kenya, and have participated in one in Ghana. I have also financially and in various volunteer capacities, contributed to several other organizations in Africa, including Amref Health Africa and Upendo Village.

Towards the end of 2012, I felt God calling me to on an even bigger purpose, and started the process of seeking to adopt two children from Kenya. While this process has unfortunately stalled due to an indefinite moratorium on foreign adoptions from Kenya, my love and commitment to this part of the world has just continued to grow.



Connect · Care · Contribute

Seeking to formalize this commitment, I've embarked on starting To Africa with Love. Aimed at providing a means to connect, care and contribute to the people of East Africa and beyond, it is my hope that To Africa with Love provides a vehicle for those that may never visit Africa - or those that want to but aren't sure yet where to start - a way to build connection and community. To raise awareness to the many challenges people from this part of the world face, and to also share their lessons of hope, faith and resiliency in the face of so much adversity.

From the beginning, I could feel God's hand at work in bringing me to Kenya. I'm so grateful for where He's brought me to today, and I can't wait to see where He takes things from here!

# **Welcoming the Stranger**

In the Hebrew Scriptures, that part of the bible we call the *Old Testament*, we find a strong religious challenge to always welcome the stranger, the foreigner. This was emphasized for two reasons: First, because the Jewish people themselves had once been foreigners and immigrants. Their scriptures kept reminding them not to forget that. Second, they believed that God's revelation, most often, comes to us through the stranger, in what's foreign to us. That belief was integral to their faith.

The great prophets developed this much further. They taught that God favors the poor preferentially and that consequently we will be judged, judged religiously, by how we treat the poor. The prophets coined this mantra (still worth memorizing): The quality of your faith will be judged by the quality of justice in the land; and the quality of justice in the land will always be judged by how orphans, widows, and strangers fare while you are alive.

Orphans, widows, and strangers! That's scriptural code for who, at any given time, are the three most vulnerable groups in society. And the prophets' message didn't go down easy. Rather it was a religious affront to many of the pious at the time who strongly believed that we will be judged religiously and morally by the rigor and strictness of our religious observance. Then, like now, social justice was often religiously marginalized.

But Jesus sides with the Hebrew prophets. For him, God not only makes a preferential option for the poor, but *God is in the poor*. How we treat the poor is how we treat God. Moreover the prophets' mantra, that we will be judged religiously by how we treat the poor, is given a normative expression in Jesus' discourse on the final judgment in the Gospel of Matthew, Chapter 25. We are all familiar, perhaps too familiar, with that text. Jesus, in effect, was answering a question: What will the last judgment be like? What will be the test? How will we be judged?

His answer is stunning and, taken baldly, is perhaps the most challenging text in the Gospels. He tells us that we will be judged, seemingly solely, on the basis of how we treated the poor, that is, on how we have treated the most vulnerable among us. Moreover at one point, he singles out "the stranger", the foreigner, the refugee: "I was a stranger and you made me welcome ... or ... you never made me welcome." We end up on the right or wrong side of God on the basis of how we treat the stranger.

What also needs to be highlighted in this text about the last judgment is that neither group, those who got it right and those who got it wrong, knew what they were doing. Both initially protest: the first by saying: "We didn't know it was you we were serving" and the second by saying: "Had we known it was you we would have responded."

Both protests, it would seem, are beside the point. In Matthew's Gospel, mature discipleship doesn't depend upon us believing that we have it right, it depends only upon us doing it right.

These scriptural principles, I believe, are very apropos today in the face of the refugee and immigrant issues we are facing in the Western world. Today, without doubt, we are facing the biggest humanitarian crisis since the end of the Second World War. Millions upon millions of people. under unjust persecution and the threat of death, are being driven from their homes and homelands with no place to go and no country or community to receive them. As Christians we may not turn our backs on them or turn them away. If Jesus is to be believed, we will be judged religiously more by how we treat refugees than by whether or not we are going to church. When we stand before God in judgment and say in protest: "When did I see you a stranger and not welcome you?" Our generation is likely to hear: "I was a Syrian refugee, and you did not welcome me."

This, no doubt, might sound naïve, over-idealistic, and fundamentalist. The issue of refugees and immigrants is both highly sensitive and very complex. Countries have borders that need to be respected and defended, just as its citizens have a right to be protected. Admittedly, there are very real political, social, economic, and security issues that have to be addressed. But, as we, our churches, and our governments, address them we must remain clear on what the scriptures, Jesus, and the social teachings of the church uncompromisingly teach: We are to welcome the stranger, irrespective of inconvenience and even if there are some dangers.

For all sorts of pragmatic reasons, political, social, economic, and security, we can perhaps justify not welcoming the stranger; but we can never justify this on Christian grounds. Not welcoming stranger is antithetical to the very heart of Jesus' message and makes us too-easily forget that we too once were the outsider.



# **Parish Choir**

The Parish Choir supports the worshipping assembly weekly at the Sunday 11:15am liturgy, September through May. It is also the main choir for Midnight Mass and Holy Week celebrations. Aside from the regularly planned songs and responses, this choir presents a wide range of musical repertoire of varying styles. Rehearsals of the Parish Choir take place in the church on **Wednesday** nights from 7:00-9:00pm, and on Sunday mornings before mass at 10:45am. Membership is open to all adults and high school teens who feel the call to serve God and this faith community through sung praise and prayer. **The Parish Choir will start rehearsals on Wednesday, September 6th** in the church. **We will begin singing at mass on Sunday, September 17**th.

# **Part-time Choir**

The Part-time choir is open to all adults who are interested in praising God through singing and/or playing an instrument on a *once-a-month* basis. The Part-time Choir ministers at the 9:30am liturgy normally on the *second* Sunday of every month, unless otherwise noted. Rehearsals take place from 7-9pm on the **Thursday** night before the second Sunday of the month. **September's rehearsal and mass will be on Thursday, September 7<sup>th</sup> and Sunday, September 10<sup>th</sup>**.

# Instrumentalists

Many devoted instrumentalists volunteer their time and talent in service of the liturgy at St. Raymond. The Instrumentalists are responsible for much of the unique "sound" of our liturgies have become known for. Instrumentalists can include rhythm section instruments such as guitar, bass, drums, and percussion as well as melody instruments such as flute, clarinet, saxophone, violin, cello, etc... A moderate to high level of proficiency is required in order to serve in this ministry, including the ability to read music and/or chord symbols.

# Children's Choir

The Children's Choir is the mainstay of our popular first Sunday of the month Family Mass which takes place October through June at the 9:30am liturgy. The Children's Choir is made up of boys and girls in grades two through six and provides opportunity for developing musical skills and liturgical understanding through upbeat, spiritual music and frequent participation at masses. 


