Through Our Alms We Touch the World VIATOR HOUSE OF HOSPITALITY

Grounded in the Viatorian commitment to young people and to "those accounted of little importance," Viator House of Hospitality (VHH) provides compassionate accompaniment of young adult male undocumented immigrants released from federal detention. While Br. Michael Gosch, CSV worked with Interfaith Committee for Detained Immigrants (ICDI), he saw the need for a program for young men "aging out" of juvenile detention facilities for immigrants. VHH opened in January 2017 with the support of the Clerics of St. Viator and several northwest suburban communities of faith. Viator House of Hospitality provides a supportive living environment where these young men can attend school, grow spiritually and emotionally, receive medical attention, even work while they await court proceedings that determine if they can become U.S. citizens.

More than 200,000 children entered the U.S. between 2014 -2017 without adults as unaccompanied minors seeking protection from the despair of their homelands, 60,000 in 2015 alone. Through the Office of Refugee Settlement, these children are housed in juvenile detention facilities operated by licensed child-care providing agencies where they are cared for and given opportunities for education while they await the outcome of legal proceedings. Most children seek "asylum," which means they must prove they have a well-founded fear of persecution in their homeland. Unfortunately, nearly 60% of these children do not have attorneys to represent them at their hearing.

When these children turn 18, they are sent to adult detention facilities, which, in the Chicago area, are collar county jails where they might wait for months until their hearings. When Br. Gosch receives notice from a juvenile detention facility or a child's attorney, he and Sr. Rayo Cuaya-Castillo, the VHH case manager, interview each young man to see if VHH can meet his needs. VHH surrounds these young men with relationships and opportunities that help them discover their unique gifts and how to share them. VHH can welcome 20 young men to live at VHH and they can stay until it is determined that they can thrive on their own.

The Clerics of St. Viator have given Viator House of Hospitality a grant to support it financially for three years. VHH hopes to develop a strong donor base to finance this important ministry far into the future. If you want to help, please use the green Alms envelopes at the church entrances and note that the donation is for Viator House of Hospitality. The alms collection on this weekend of September 2/3 will be for VHH. VHH needs volunteers to tutor, cover shifts when no staff members can be present, provide rides and help in many other ways. Parish Choir

The Parish Choir supports the worshipping assembly weekly at the Sunday 11:15am liturgy, September through May. It is also the main choir for Midnight Mass and Holy Week celebrations. Aside from the regularly planned songs and responses, this choir presents a wide range of musical repertoire of varying styles. Rehearsals of the Parish Choir take place in the church on **Wednesday** nights from 7:00-9:00pm, and on Sunday mornings before mass at 10:45am. Membership is open to all adults and high school teens who feel the call to serve God and this faith community through sung praise and prayer. **The Parish Choir will start rehearsals on Wednesday, September 6th** in the church. **We will begin singing at mass on Sunday, September 17th.**

Part-time Choir

The Part-time choir is open to all adults who are interested in praising God through singing and/or playing an instrument on a *once-a-month* basis. The Part-time Choir ministers at the 9:30am liturgy normally on the *second* Sunday of every month, unless otherwise noted. Rehearsals take place from 7-9pm on the **Thursday** night before the second Sunday of the month. **September's rehearsal and mass will be on Thursday, September 7th and Sunday, September 10th.**

<u>Instrumentalists</u>

Many devoted instrumentalists volunteer their time and talent in service of the liturgy at St. Raymond. The Instrumentalists are responsible for much of the unique "sound" of our liturgies have become known for. Instrumentalists can include rhythm section instruments such as guitar, bass, drums, and percussion as well as melody instruments such as flute, clarinet, saxophone, violin, cello, etc... A moderate to high level of proficiency is required in order to serve in this ministry, including the ability to read music and/or chord symbols.

Children's Choir

The Children's Choir is the mainstay of our popular first Sunday of the month Family Mass which takes place October through June at the 9:30am liturgy. The Children's Choir is made up of boys and girls in grades two through six and provides opportunity for developing musical skills and liturgical understanding through upbeat, spiritual music and frequent participation at masses. The Children's Choir will also sing for the Christmas Eve 2pm and Easter Sunday 9:30am Family Masses. For those in grades 4-6, there will be opportunities to begin learning the fundamentals of cantoring through a mentoring process which will lead to real life experience at the cantor podium! Rehearsals of the Children's Choir take place on designated Monday afternoon's from 4-5pm in church. The first rehearsal will be on Monday, September 11th.

Teen Choir

The Teen Choir is open to anyone in grades 7-12 (gals *and* guys!) and ministers on the **4**th **Sunday of the month** at the 9:30am liturgy during the school year. The group will learn and perform more advanced liturgical music repertoire in a variety of styles, with emphasis on four part harmony. They will also have opportunities for semi-regular cantor/solo assignments during liturgies as the year progresses. The Teen Choir also sings for the Christmas Eve 4:30pm Mass. Rehearsals take place in the church from 4-5pm on the **two Tuesdays before the 4**th **Sunday**. **The first rehearsals for this group with be on Tuesday, September 12th and 19th and its first mass is on Sunday, September 24th.**

Turning to God in Times of Tragedy

Times of disaster or great sadness are trying for us all. Yet these times present opportunities to teach your children lasting spiritual lessons and the importance of trusting God.

Faith Themes

Jesus calls us to eternal life with our Father in heaven. The church recognizes corporal and spiritual works of mercy.

Natural Teachable Moments

After the sudden death of a friend or family member

When a natural disaster strikes a community or another country, leaving pain, destruction, famine, disease, orphans, or homelessness

When political oppression, social injustice, or genocide create a refugee crisis

In the days after September 11, 2001, churches, synagogues, and mosques were filled with people. Around the world candles were lit. Impromptu shrines were filled with flowers and prayer intentions. Prayers were offered for the dead and their suffering families. In tragic times our children naturally have questions about God and heaven. Treat their questions with respect. Be patient, knowing that you do not have all the answers. Pray with your children for all those caught up in tragedy.

Starting the Conversation

Think of concrete ways that you as a family can be a source of help and comfort for those who suffer, especially those faced with tragic situations.

To Help You Connect

One practical and easy first step after a tragedy has struck a community, group, or country—the earthquake in Haiti, the floods in New Orleans, the famines in Africa, or the tsunami in Asia—is to check the website of organizations such as Catholic Charities, the Campaign for Human Development, Red Cross, Amnesty International, Jesuit Refugee Service, and Catholic Relief Services. Or perhaps you can get on their mailing list beforehand. These organizations often distribute information about various ways people can immediately help after a disaster, such as donations of urgently needed goods and services. Also, check with your local parish to see what it might be organizing. Then help your child to appreciate the many good things that people of faith are doing in the world and to see how she might become part of this effort.

Jesus' parable of the Last Judgment tells us that we will be judged according to our faith and how we treat others: Matthew 25:31–46

What the Church Says about This Topic

In Catholic Church teaching, the corporal and spiritual works of mercy are actions we can perform that extend God's mercy and compassion to those in need. In order to better understand this, it is helpful to clarify what we mean by God's mercy. At Mass, during the penitential act, we pray, "Lord, have mercy!" Sometimes, when we think of the word mercy, we picture someone throwing himself on his knees before a cruel villain, pleading to be spared some punishment. This is not our understanding of God's mercy. We do not ask for God's mercy because we are afraid of incurring God's wrath as punishment for our sins. Rather, when we call on God to have mercy, we are calling on God in the only way we know him—as one who responds with infinite compassion to those in need. When we show mercy to others, we are responding as God responds: with compassion. Works of mercy are opportunities to extend God's compassion to those in need.

There are two kinds of works of mercy: corporal and spiritual. Corporal works of mercy are the kind of acts by which we help our neighbors with their everyday material and physical needs. These include things like feeding the hungry, finding a home for the homeless, clothing the naked, visiting the sick and those in prison, giving alms to the poor, and burying the dead. Spiritual works of mercy are the kind of acts through which we help our neighbors meet the needs that are emotional and spiritual, including instructing, advising, consoling, comforting, forgiving, and bearing wrongs with patience.

Interested In Becoming Catholic? Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA)

One of the great **gifts** we've been given is the **opportunity** to **BE church together!** At St. Raymond's we do that in so many ways: through our liturgies, formation and education programs, outreach programs and our socializing and hospitality. We continually strive to create an atmosphere where **God's active presence** will be **discovered among us**.

And so we always try to **welcome new members** – especially those who might be searching for something more. Sometimes all that is needed is a **gentle invitation** -- a little encouragement from someone to do something that we've been thinking about for a long time -- a little encouragement to stop putting something off -- and recognize that perhaps now is the time to take action.

And so we encourage you, our parishioners, to prayerfully consider people you know -- a spouse, friend, relative, coworker, or neighbor -- and invite them to explore our faith.

The **RCIA** (Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults) is designed for men and women who have never been baptized or who were baptized in another Christian denomination and are considering becoming Catholic. It is also appropriate for baptized Catholics who have received little formal religious education or who have not received the sacraments of Eucharist or Confirmation.

The RCIA is a wonderful process, involving some of our own parishioners who accompany the candidates on their faith journey. Our *regular meetings* will begin on Monday, **September 11, 2017**. 


