

### A letter to the parish on becoming involved

As many of you know I was St. Raymond's Business Manager for six years until I retired a little more than two years ago. I'm currently a member of St. Raymond's capital campaign committee and I'm here to briefly discuss the campaign and to explain why I think it is important that we all support this campaign.

Mary Jane and I have been members of St. Raymond Parish for about thirty years. Both of our sons graduated from St. Raymond School. Our son Nick was baptized here when he was seven years old and our son Andrew married Nicole in this sanctuary eight years ago. And Mary Jane and I hope to celebrate our 50<sup>th</sup> wedding anniversary with our friends here next July – yes, it's true – I married Mary Jane when she was only 8 years old!

St. Raymond has meant a lot to Mary Jane and me. When we first moved to Mount Prospect from Skokie we attended mass at St Emily and St Cecilia, but . . . when we visited St. Raymond, the whole package came together for us — welcoming parishioners, moving liturgies, uplifting music, relevant homilies that were interestingly delivered, and a highly rated school.

Over the years Mary Jane has been involved in a number of ministries at St. Raymond, including Moms Plus, Women's Spirituality, Gathering of Women, the Elizabeth Ministry, and the Music Ministry as both a cantor and choir member.

As for myself, before coming to St. Raymond I was never a joiner or a volunteer. I couldn't be bothered. Then, one day, Jan Saillard called me and asked whether I would be willing to join the Cub Scout Committee – it'll only involve about an hour or so a month, she said. I didn't know Jan at the time, but I liked being asked, so I joined and eventually became a Cub Scout Den Leader and Cub Master. And I loved it!

And that's when I realized how important it was to become involved! It's only through our personal involvement in the life of our parish that things get accomplished. Since those scouting days, I've served on the School Board, Technology Committee, Construction Committee, the past two capital campaigns, the summer raffle, and as a Eucharistic Minister.

And while I was your business manager, I was able to see scores of other ministries in action -- I saw what marvelous things they do for our parish, for our own parishioners, and for those in need beyond the parish walls. All of this "stuff" that we do is what makes St. Raymond one of the most dynamic parishes in the northwest suburbs.

All it takes for someone to become involved is to be asked – one person, making the effort, to ask another person – *Can you help?* 

And so, now I'm asking you to become involved in the capital campaign that we've formally kicked off last weekend. The objectives of our campaign are not glamorous – we're not building a new gym, or a junior high wing, or a community gathering room as we have in the past. We are looking to secure our future – to ensure that St. Raymond can continue to provide the physical environment in which our many ministries can successfully and safely continue to flourish.

As your business manager I was able to become intimately involved with our ancient, inefficient, 60 year old heating systems; I heard your comments – frequently -- about our deteriorating, unsafe parking lot; and I felt miserable when I saw how students and teachers suffered in 90+ degree classrooms for weeks in the early fall each year. These are just a few examples of how important it is to pay attention to the parish's infrastructure. In this campaign we are planning to address these and other infrastructure issues.

And that's when I realized how important it was to become involved! It's only through our personal involvement in the life of our parish that things get accomplished.

We want to make sure that those who come after us — our children, our grandchildren, and those new families who discover St. Raymond (as Mary Jane and I did 30 years ago) — that those who come after us can continue to live St. Raymond's mission for many more decades to come . . . continue to live OUR mission of Welcoming, Loving, and Serving ALL who pass through our doors.

Throughout this campaign we are working to personally speak to every member of our parish community about the campaign and what we hope to accomplish. We have a goal of raising \$2.5 Million dollars over the five-year life of the campaign. For the campaign to succeed, we need our entire parish family to be involved.

### On not Cultivating Restlessness

By Ron Rolheiser

Thirty-four years ago when I launched this column. I would never have said this: Restlessness is not something to be cultivated, no matter how romantic that might seem. Don't get Jesus confused with Hamlet, peace with disquiet, depth with dissatisfaction, or genuine happiness with the existential anxiety of the artist. Restlessness inside us doesn't need to be encouraged; it wreaks enough havoc all on its own.

But I'm a late convert to this view. From earliest childhood through mid-life, I courted a romance with restlessness, with stoicism, with being the lonely outsider, with being the one at the party who found it all too superficial to be real. Maybe that contributed to my choosing seminary and priesthood; certainly it helps explain why I entitled this column, In Exile. For most of my life, I have equated restlessness with depth, as something to be cultivated.

This came naturally to me and all along the way I've found powerful mentors to help me carry my solitude in that way. During my high school years, I was intrigued with Shakespeare's, Hamlet. I virtually memorized it. Hamlet represented depth, intensity, and romance; he wasn't a beer-drinker. For me, he was the lonely prophet, radiating depth beyond superficiality.

In my seminary years I graduated to Plato ("We are fired into life with a madness that comes from the gods and has us believe that we can achieve a great embrace, make ourselves immortal, and contemplate the divine"); to Augustine ("You have made us for yourself, Lord, and our hearts are restless until they rest in you"); to John of the Cross (We ao through life fired by love's urgent longings); to Karl Rahner ("In the torment of the insufficiency of everything attainable, we learn that here in this life there is no finished symphony"). Reading these thinkers helped me put my youthful romanticism under a high symbolic hedge.

Alongside these spiritual writers, I was much influenced by a number of novelists who helped instill in me the notion that life is meant to be lived with such an inner intensity and high romanticism so as to preclude any simple satisfaction in life's normal, everyday pleasures and domestic joys. For me, Nikos Kazantzakis' characters radiated a passion that made them virtually godlike and irresistibly enviable, even as they struggled not to self-destruct; Iris Murdoch described loves that were so obsessive, and yet so attractive, as to make everything outside of them unreal; and Doris Lessing and Albert Camus seduced me with images of an inner disquiet that made ordinary life seem flat and not worthwhile. The idea grew in me that it was far nobler to die in unrequited longing than to live in anything else.

Better dead in intensity that alive in domestic normalcy. Restlessness was to be encouraged.

And much in our culture, especially in the arts and the entertainment industry, foster that temptation, namely, to self-define as restless and to identify this disquiet with depth and with the angst of the artist. Once we define ourselves in this way, as complex, incurable romantics, we have an excuse for being difficult and we also have an excuse for betrayal and infidelity. For now, in the words of a song by The Eagles, we are restless spirits on an endless flight. Understandably, then, we fly above the ordinary rules for life and happiness and our complexity is justification enough for whatever ways we act out. As Amy Winehouse famously self-defines: "I told you I was troubled, and you know that I'm no good." Why should anyone be mystified by our refusal of normal life and ordinary happiness?

There's something inside us, particularly when we are young, that tempts us towards that kind of self-definition. And, for that time in our lives, when we're young, I believe, it's healthy. The young are supposed to overlyidealistic, incurably romantic, and distrustful of any lazy fall into settling for second-best. As Doris Lessing puts it, there's only one real sin in life and that's calling secondbest by anything other than what it is, second-best! My wish is that all young people would read Plato, Augustine, John of the Cross, Karl Rahner, Nikos Kazantzakis, Iris Murdoch, Doris Lessing, Jane Austin, and Albert Camus.

But, except for authors such as Plato, Augustine, John of the Cross and Karl Rahner, who integrate that insatiable restlessness and existential angst into a bigger, meaningful narrative, we should be weary of defining ourselves as restless and cultivating that. High romanticism will only serve us well if we eventually set it within a self-understanding that doesn't make restlessness an end in itself. Just feeling noble won't bring much peace into our lives and, as we age and mature, peace does become the prize. Romeo, Juliet, Hamlet, Zorba the Greek, Doctor Zhivago, and the other such megaromantic figures on our screens and in our novels can enflame our romantic imaginations, but they aren't in the end images for the type of intimacy that makes for a permanent meeting of hearts inside the body of Christ.

### FitnessGram Testing

FitnessGram is a fitness test that measures physical ability. It helps our students understand the relationship between fitness and overall health. FitnessGram tests include: pacer tests, push ups, sit ups, mile runs and flexibility tests. The beginning of the school year provided a baseline for tracking improvement throughout the year. Combined with our classroom activities, students work to improve their individual scores in each area and have friendly competition with their classmates.

### **Classroom Activities**

Grades K-2 —We have been working on routines and procedures moving in space, and learning various fitness movements and exercises.

Grades 3-5 - Students will be introduced to our new heart rate monitors. We will be learning about our resting heart rate, target heart rate, and target heart rate zone.

Grades 6-8 - Junior High students will also be working with our heart rate monitors. We will be collecting heart rate data and working on understanding how to improve fitness ability over time.



Heart Rate



Tracking heart rate allows students to exercise to their full, individual potential. The Monitors heart rate monitors connect students, teachers and parents, empowering them to make better decisions to maximize student outcomes. Students are able to get feedback during class, stay motivated and see results.



### **AWARENESS**

Domestic violence is a pattern of behavior. It is used to exert power and control over another person. It is found in the context of a dating, family or household relationship.

#### Questions to ask:

Does your partner isolate you from family and friends? Are you being physically, psychologically, economically or sexually abused? Is your partner attempting to destroy your self-esteem and self-confidence?

Domestic violence victims often report:

"I didn't know it was abuse.", "I thought I could fix it.", "I didn't tell anyone." These are traps that keep people bound.
