Welcome Our Newest Member into our Faith Community Celebrate the Risen Christ in our Midst Share in the Reception Afterwards

On Holy Saturday, at the **Easter Vigil**, our parish community will welcome Beau Sullivan into our Faith Community. Beau will be **received** into the Catholic Church from another Christian denomination.

The Easter Vigil is the most important liturgical celebration of the year. It's a wonderful experience -- filled with some of our very best symbols: **story-telling** (Scriptures that tell us who we are as God's beloved ones), **water** (baptism), **fire** (the Paschal candle is lit from the new fire and passed throughout the assembly), **Eucharist** is shared by all, and our new members celebrate the Sacrament of **Confirmation**.

Beau has this past year, journeyed through many stages. He reflected on the **challenges** of the **Gospel**, on our tradition of **prayer** and on the **teachings** of the church. He also participated in some of our **parish gatherings**. During this time he found strength in **God's grace** and in the **support** of **our faith community**. He has been an **inspiration** to **us** -- and so we welcome him with great joy! We are so blessed to have Beau with us in the breaking of the bread.

This Mass is a celebration of Easter, so if you participate, you need not come again on Easter Sunday. The celebration begins at 7:30 PM. And afterwards you're all invited to a reception in the Community Room where we can further welcome Beau. **Please join us -- you'll be glad you did!**



COME TO EASTER!

We keep watch at St Raymond Church from Holy Thursday night until Holy Saturday night. During this time there are six different services here at our parish. Each is different and it is great to come to all of them.

The six services fit together like "hand-in-glove." Together they form a single, three-daylong liturgy. Each service has a different mood, different once-a-year rituals, different songs and scripture stories. Some services even have their own special aromas, such as the myrrh used on Good Friday evening or the chrism used at the Easter Vigil. On Holy Thursday evening we wash each other's feet following Jesus' command to his disciples and process around the church with the holy Eucharist as we rest in the garden.

On Good Friday morning we gather for prayer for 9:00 a.m. Mark's Gospel says that Jesus was crucified at that hour. We gather again for the Way of the Cross at noon to begin tres ori, the three hours of the Passion of Christ.

The most important service of Good Friday is at 3:00 p.m. when we remember Jesus died and at that time we show our love and affection for the Holy Cross. The 6:30 p.m. Taize Prayer Service is an opportunity to reflect upon and contemplate Christ's passion, through meditative songs of worship, silence, and symbols of light and veneration. It is a powerful way to faithfully "watch and pray", as Jesus asked of his disciples. We continue to reflect and pray where our world still needs to be uplifted and transformed through our self-giving.

At 8:00 p.m. on Good Friday evening, the hour, we bury the Lord. That's something very special and different. It is a comforting service to remind and remember god's eternal embrace in all our dying and sacrifices. It is a service of hope, love and promise. The Easter Vigil, on Holy Saturday night, is the most important liturgy of the year, and it begins with a fire! The Vigil is the "heart" of the Catholic year. It's the first service of Easter. Even if you come to church Easter Sunday morning, please also come to the Vigil. It's just too wonderful to miss! Make our parish your home-away-from-home during these holiest days of the year.



Good Friday By Ron Rolheiser OMI

Good Friday was bad long before it was good, at least from outward appearances. God was being crucified by all that can go bad in the world: pride, jealousy, distrust, wound, self-interest, sin. It's no accident the Gospels tell us that, as Jesus was dying, it grew dark in the middle of the day. Few images are more telling. As Jesus hung upon the cross, seemingly, light gave way to darkness, love to hatred, and life to death. How can that be good?

Moreover, as he was dying, Jesus no longer seemed divine, powerful, and in control of things, both in terms of what was happening in the world and in what was happening inside of himself. The world was sinking into distrust and, if the Gospels are to be believed, Jesus, the incarnate God, seemed to be sinking into a personal doubt, one so gripping that it triggered the words: "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me!" What's happening here? How can this be good?

To understand what happened on Good Friday we need to separate what was happening on the surface from what was happening at some deeper place.

The surface event was bad and can never by any imaginary be called good. Sincere religious people, good though weak, out of fear and weakness were selling out what was best in them and either helping incite the execution of Jesus or standing passively by and letting it happen. In effect, other than a few strong women who were not succumbing to fear or group-hysteria but who are too disempowered to practically do anything about it, everyone was aiding in the crucifixion of God, either out of ignorance, jealousy, or weakness. In Jesus' own words, darkness was having its hour. The human, social, and political drama that played out on Good Friday was not good. It showed humanity at its worst before God's seeming silence.

But there was something deeper happening on Good Friday, a drama was playing out inside the recesses of Jesus' private soul and conscience the result of which was antithetical to all that was happening on the surface, in the crowd. Inside his struggle to accept what was happening in that situation and to accept what was being asked of him, we see the ultimate moral and religious drama: love struggling with and them triumphing over hate, trust struggling with and then triumphing over paranoia, and forgiveness struggling with and then triumphing over bitterness.

We see that epic struggle, first, playing itself out in his agony in the garden of Gethsemane where Jesus literally sweats blood in the face of his options, that is, standing

before every form of opposition, hatred, ignorance, and misunderstanding he must decide to either give himself over in trust or to flee in self-preservation. He chooses the former and, we are told, he is then strengthened by a divine presence.

But acceptance is not exactly full surrender and the next day, on Good Friday, the final test takes place. The angel who strengthened him in Gethsemane seems to disappear when he is on the cross and a crushing dark night of doubt now racks him to the point of making him cry out with what seemingly sounds like despair: "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me!" His acceptance, given to his Father the night before, at this crucial moment, is made infinitely more difficult by the seeming absence of his Father who had, up to now, had been his very breath. In the face of that seeming abandonment, Jesus had to make a choice for faith, love, and trust at the rawest level, in ultimate darkness. What's the choice? What does Jesus do?

In the words of Karl Rahner, Jesus lets himself "sink into the incomprehensibility of God." He surrenders to God whom he cannot at that moment feel or understand but only trust. Here's where Good Friday turns from bad to good, Jesus surrenders himself not in bitterness, grasping, or anger, but in trust, gratitude, and forgiveness. In that surrender, the struggle between good and evil, the most epic of all battles, is won.

Ultimately, all that's wrong in our world will not be vanquished by a morally superior violence, no matter how virtuous are those who are doing the vanquishing. Good violence will never rid the world of bad violence. We will rid our world of those powers that perennially crucify God only when each of us, like Jesus, can let our bitterness, grasping, and anger give way to trust, gratitude, and forgiveness. And, barring being extraordinarily gifted by special grace, we will all, like Jesus, have to let ourselves sink into the incomprehensibility of God, that is, by trusting even when we don't understand, by loving even when we are hated, and by forgiving even when we are being hurt.

All of us will have our Good Fridays, not least in our experience of death. By every appearance, they will look bad, but if we give ourselves over in trust they will be good.

Praying in Preschool











Leading Catholics into the season of *Lent*, Pope Francis urged people to slow down amid the noise, haste and high-tech world to rediscover the power of silence. The preschoolers are taking the Pope's advice and spending extra time in daily prayer during this season of preparation. On Ash Wednesday, each child placed a cross labeled with a special intention into a class prayer box. Every day, one or two crosses are picked from the box and people named on the cross are held in prayer.

The preschoolers visited church to learn about the Stations of the Cross. Deacon Lorbach read a book which explained each station. He explained that the stations recall Jesus' journey and teach us about our own journey. The children learned that Jesus fell three times and each time He fell, Jesus got back up. Jesus met His mother and others who helped Him along His journey. Like Jesus, the children talked about people in their lives who support them whenever they fall and help them to continue on their journeys.



Domestic violence is a pattern of behavior. It is used to exert power and control over another person. It is found in the context of a dating, family or household relationship.

Questions to ask:

- Does your partner isolate you from family and friends?
- Are you being physically, psychologically, economically or sexually abused?
- Is your partner attempting to destroy your self-esteem and self-confidence?


