



Congratulations to John R. Burnett! On April 08, Most Rev. Andrew P. Wypych, will preside at the Rite of Institution into the Ministry of Reader and welcome him into that ministry at the Chapel of the Immaculate Conception, University of Saint Mary of the Lake in Mundelein. He is part of a cohort of 28 candidates who will become instituted Readers.

At the institution, Bishop Wypych will charge that Johnny be faithful in handing on the Word of God so that it may grow strong in the hearts of His people. Additionally, being an instituted Reader also means "taking on a special office within the Christian community." Besides proclaiming the word in the liturgical assembly, an instituted Reader is responsible for:

- instructing children and adults in the faith;
- preparing them to receive the sacraments worthily;
- bringing the message of salvation to those who have not yet received it.

This is an awesome responsibility. But it is part of the continuing discernment process as Johnny moves forward on his journey in formation and listens to God's plan for him in future ministry.

During formation this year, Johnny is attending academic courses in Church History, Old Testament, New Testament, Ecclesiology & Mariology, Spiritual Theology, Christian Anthropology, and Worship and Liturgical Music. He also participated in a weekend retreat and will attend a candidates-only retreat prior to his institution as Reader. Additionally, elements of his formation include a Service to Charity field education experience, completed last summer; and this year he is engaged in Service to the Word field education. He attends monthly spiritual direction and is present for numerous formation sessions as he continues his journey on the Candidate Path toward the Order of Deacon.

Presently, there are about 500 active deacons in the Archdiocese of Chicago, with 60 men currently in the Institute for Diaconal Studies.

Please keep in your prayers John R. Burnett, all candidates who will be instituted as Readers, their wives and families, and all candidates in formation, that they might continue to answer God's call to serve His Church.



I grew up in the non-denominational church but after Jack arrived, I felt called to pursue becoming a Catholic. I like the idea that our family is unified in our Catholic Christian faith and Sarah and I look forward to guiding Jack in his faith as he grows. We have felt very welcomed by the St. Raymond's community and RCIA staff and I look forward to continuing to grow my faith in Jesus Christ with my family



Have you ever had questions about your faith in Jesus? Have you ever wondered what was it like when Jesus walked along the Sea of Galilee and entered villages sharing a new message of hope? Have you asked yourself why the Middle East is at times a hotbed of aggression that effects the whole world? Have you ever thought if the death and resurrection of Jesus were real and if the Holy Sepulcher in Jerusalem is the actual burial place of Jesus? Have you ever considered taking a trip to reflect on your faith and seeing the world from a complete different perspective? If you care to know more about the parish trip to the holy land and Jordan planned for this coming November please come to a meeting on April 16th in the community room at 7pm . We will have a short presentation to provide information and explain more about this trip.

Since today is the celebration of Easter that recalls the resurrection of Jesus, let me share a thought. When Jesus' friends experienced the resurrection and they began witnessing to that in real ways. The empty tomb or 'sight' became a place of visitation. (Much similar to what we do in cemeteries) This was outside of the walls of the city where executions took place. In time the city expanded and surrounded this sight. Emperor Hadrian who thought this group "Christians" a nuisance erected a temple to Venus over this sight. When Emperor Constantine and his mother Helena came on the scene in 300 they knew exactly the area (Golgotha and tomb) and built over this and erected the first complex of two churches. In the 1970's as teams of archeologists excavated areas of subfloors they found remnants and evidence of a quarry, of nails, wood and chains that gave evidence of executions. In other places they found evidence of trees and fruit of carobs, jujube and olives suggesting a garden. Hence, according to historical and archeological findings this area most likely can be the place of Jesus' death and resurrection. This may be good information however, what really helps us come to believe? From my point of view, it's what the first followers of Jesus did and we do today: seek the signs of new life around us, look at what has passed, find the new beginnings of faith and trust.



We do not attend mass for our own personal fulfillment, instead we attend to praise God and give thanks for his blessings.

Dress the Altar – Prepare the altar for mass by bringing up the linens and dressing altar.

Bread and Wine – bringing up the gifts is an acceptance of Christ's blessings for ourselves and our parish community.

Intercessions – Where our community hears the prayer requests for the parish. Adults are asked to read community member names, while children are invited to read the remainder of the prepared script.

Consider participating to celebrate milestones. Examples include birthdays, new seasons in life, acceptance into college, adoption/gotcha day, and sport accomplishments.





The Empty Tomb

Believers and non-believers alike have been arguing about the resurrection since the day Jesus rose. What really happened? How was he raised from the dead? Did an actual dead body really come back to life and step out of the grave or was the resurrection a monumental lifechanging event inside the consciousness of Jesus' followers? Or was the resurrection both, a real physical event and an event inside the consciousness of believers?

Obviously nobody was there to see what actually happened. Those who claimed Jesus was alive again didn't see him rise and emerge from the tomb, they met him only after he had already risen and, immediately, believers and sceptics began to divide from each other, persons who claimed to have touched him and persons who doubted that testimony.

There have been sceptics and believers ever since and no shortage of persons, professional theologians and non-scholarly Christians alike, who believe in the resurrection of Jesus as a faith event but not as a physical event, where an actual body came out of a grave. The faith event is what's important, they claim, and it is incidental whether or not Jesus' actual body came out of the grave.

Was Jesus' resurrection a faith event or a physical event? It was both. For Christians it is the most monumental event, faith and otherwise, in history. Two thousand subsequent years cannot be explained, except by the reality of the resurrection. To understand the resurrection of Jesus only as a literal fact, that his body rose from the grave, is to cut the resurrection off from much of its meaning. However, that being admitted, for Christians, the resurrection must also be a radically physical event. Why?

First, because the Gospels are pretty clear in emphasizing that the tomb was empty and that the resurrected Jesus was more than a spirit or ghost. We see, for instance, in Luke's Gospel where Jesus invites a doubting Thomas to verify his physicality: "Look at my hands and my feet. It's really me. Touch me. You can see that I have a living body; a ghost does not have a body like this."

As well, and very importantly, to cut the resurrection off from the literal fact that there was real physical transformation of a once dead corpse is to rob it of some of its important meanings and perhaps of the deepest root of its credibility. For the resurrection of Christ to have full meaning it must, among other things, have been a brute physical fact. There needs to be an empty tomb and a dead body returned to life. Why?

Not as some kind of miracle proof, but because of the incarnation. To believe in the incarnation and not to believe in the radical physical character of the resurrection is a contradiction. We believe that in the incarnation the Word was made flesh. This takes the mystery of Christ and the reality of the resurrection out of the realm of pure spirit. The incarnation always connotes a reality that's radically physical, tangible, and touchable, like the old dictionary definition of matter as "something extended in space and having weight."

To believe in the incarnation is to believe that God was born into real physical flesh, lived in real physical flesh, died in real physical flesh, and rose in real physical flesh. To believe that the resurrection was only an event in the faith consciousness of the disciples, however real, rich, and radical that might be imagined, is to rob the incarnation of its radical physical character

and to fall into the kind of dualism that values spirit and denigrates the physical. Such a dualism devalues the incarnation and this impoverishes the meaning of the resurrection. If the resurrection is only a spiritual event then it is also only an anthropological one and not also a cosmic one. That's a way of saying that it's then an event only about human consciousness and not also about the cosmos.

But Jesus' resurrection isn't just something radically new in terms of human consciousness; it's also something that's radically new in terms of atoms and molecules. The resurrection rearranged hearts and minds, but it also rearranged atoms. Until Jesus' resurrection, dead bodies did not come back to life; they stayed dead, so when his came back to life there was something radically new both at the level of faith and at the level of the atoms and molecules. Precisely because of its brute physicality, Jesus' resurrection offers new hope to atoms as well as to people.

I believe that Jesus was raised from the dead, literally. I believe too that this event was, as the rich insights within contemporary theology point out, highly spiritual: an event of faith, of changed consciousness, of new hope empowering a new charity and a new forgiveness. But it was also an event of changed atoms and of a changed dead body. It was radically physical, just as are all events that are part of the incarnation wherein God takes on real flesh.

Through Our Alms We Touch the World St. Raymond Parish Ministries

The entire alms collection on Easter will go directly to St. Raymond Parish to support the over 100 ministries, faith formation programs and the mission of our parish. St. Raymond is a large and dynamic faith community which has been blessed over and over by the talents, generosity and treasure of its members.

Without the faithful and continued financial support you offer this faith community, we would not be able to be a parish that continues to respond to the Lord's great commission of ministry and service to all who call this faith community their home, as well as those who grace our doors in need. Lutheran Church of the Cross Food Pantry

The Lutheran Church of the Cross houses the largest private charitable food pantry serving five towns in the northwest suburbs, including Mount Prospect. It is located in Arlington Heights next to the former Forest View High School, now the District 214 Headquarters. The LLC food pantry is an agency of the Greater Chicago Food Depository. This affiliation enables the food pantry to purchase \$8.00 worth of staples for every \$1.00 donated. The food pantry serves an average of 100 families per week which totals over 5,000 families per year. Every family receives a twenty pound bag of staples, along with a box of meat, bakery, grocery and dairy products provided by local grocery stores. It distributes food every Tuesday from 9 am-1 pm.

As a result of an extraordinary donation of 30 tons of food by the Arlington Heights Post Office annual food drive, combined with the 80 tons of food donated and purchased from the Greater Chicago Food Depository, the LLC food pantry distributed over 100 tons of food during the past year.

The LLC food pantry supplies St. Raymond parish with a substantial amount of food weekly and also supplies food to the Viatorian House of Hospitality, home to twenty young male refugees. The LLC food pantry is completely dependent on volunteers. Presently, seven St. Raymond parishioners volunteer there each Tuesday. Cash donations are preferred, but food donations are also appreciated. Alms collected on the weekends of April 7/8 and 14/15 will go the Lutheran Church of the Cross Food Pantry. Please use the green Alms envelopes found at each church entrance if you wish to make a donation. Thank you for your generosity.



Seder Meal with 7th Grade

The 7th grade students hosted a Passover Seder meal for the 2nd graders on Friday, March 16th, to help them prepare for their First Communion. We began by explaining that the Seder meal was a ritual meal celebrated so that all generations would remember the Exodus, the deliverance of the Jewish people from Egypt. Jesus and his apostles gathered on Holy Thursday to celebrate the Passover meal for the Last Supper.

Our Seder meal followed the Christian format that showed how the Old Covenant Passover meal became the New Covenant Eucharist. We followed the Seder tradition of reading questions and answers about the Exodus including Scripture readings. The script explained how each food has a special significance in the Exodus story. Many of the prayers were prayers that we also say during our celebration of Mass.

We hope that our Seder celebration helped the 2nd graders understand a little more about Eucharist as they prepare for their First Holy Communion.


