

Have you ever had questions about your faith in Jesus? Have you ever wondered what was it like when Jesus walked along the Sea of Galilee and entered villages sharing a new message of hope? Have you asked yourself why the Middle East is at times a hotbed of aggression that effects the whole world? Have you ever thought if the death and resurrection of Jesus were real and if the Holy Sepulcher in Jerusalem is the actual burial place of Jesus? Have you ever considered taking a trip to reflect on your faith and seeing the world from a complete different perspective? If you care to know more about the parish trip to the holy land and Jordan planned for this coming November please come to a meeting on April 16th in the community room at 7pm. We will have a short presentation to provide information and explain more about this trip.

Since today is the celebration of Easter that recalls the resurrection of Jesus, let me share a thought. When Jesus' friends experienced the resurrection and they began witnessing to that in real ways. The empty tomb or 'sight' became a place of visitation. (Much similar to what we do in cemeteries) This was outside of the walls of the city where executions took place. In time the city expanded and surrounded this sight. Emperor Hadrian who thought this group "Christians" a nuisance erected a temple to Venus over this sight. When Emperor Constantine and his mother Helena came on the scene in 300 they knew exactly the area (Golgotha and tomb) and built over this and erected the first complex of two churches. In the 1970's as teams of archeologists excavated areas of subfloors they found remnants and evidence of a quarry, of nails, wood and chains that gave evidence of executions. In other places they found evidence of trees and fruit of carobs, jujube and olives suggesting a garden. Hence, according to historical and archeological findings this area most likely can be the place of Jesus' death and resurrection. This may be good information however, what really helps us come to believe? From my point of view, it's what the first followers of Jesus did and we do today: seek the signs of new life around us, look at what has passed, find the new beginnings of faith and trust.

Through Our Alms We Touch The World Loom Chicago

Loom Chicago is a community of refuge women living in Chicago who weave together their creativity and traditions to make and sell functional handmade art, clothing and accessories. These women have fled their country of origin due to a credible fear of persecution on account of their race, religion, political opinion, national origin, or social group. Many of them have spent years or even decades in refugee camps before arriving in the United States and feel isolated when they arrive here. Loom Chicago provides the opportunity to join a supportive community of creative enterprising women to collaborate, develop new skills, and earn extra income. Through the encouragement of the group and skills learned in weekly workshops, many of the women earn their first-ever paycheck, learn financial literacy skills, gain the confidence to call themselves business women, and eventually secure part or full-time work in and outside of the fashion industry. The refugee



women artisans are from Nepal, Bhutan, Afghanistan, Sudan, Uganda, Syria, Iraq and other strife-ridden countries. Seventy-five percent of the proceeds from the sale of their one-of-a-kind products is kept by the artisan, while twenty-five percent goes back to the program in order to help fund it. Loom Chicago is a non-profit social enterprise of the **Catholic Charities Refugee Resettlement Program** and welcomes your donations, purchases and involvement. The handmade products can be purchased online at http://www.loomchicago.com. Volunteer opportunities are available and the program welcomes anyone with an art technique to share and instruct the artisans during one of their weekly workshops.

"These are women who have fled war and violence from around the globe and have resettled in Chicago; at Loom they get the opportunity to form a supportive community, learn from each other and from local artists, earn an income and empower themselves in their readjustment in a new country and culture different from the ones they come from." 






Emmaus Walk Grief Support Group



When Does Faith Disappear? By Ron Rolheiser OMI

When Friedrich Nietzsche declared that "God is dead" he added a question: What kind of a sponge does it take to wipe away a whole horizon?

I often ask that question because just in my own lifetime there has been an unprecedented decline in the number of people who go to church regularly and, more recently, an equally unprecedented spike in the number of people who claim to have lost their faith completely and are now classified under a religious category called, "None".

This latter group (persons who when asked about their religious affiliation on a census form answer with the word, *None*) has essentially doubled in the last twenty years and today in Canada and the USA make up over 30% of the population. The numbers are much the same for Western Europe and other secularized parts of the world.

But have these individuals really lost their faith? When they use the word "None" to refer to their religious beliefs they generally explain that with phrases to this effect: I just no longer believe! It doesn't make sense to me anymore! I've lost faith in religion and the church! I can't pretend any longer! I've lost my faith in those beliefs! I'm not sure whether or not I believe in God!

What's common among all these phrases is the concept of "believing" or "belief": "I just don't believe it anymore!" But is ceasing to believe in something the same thing as losing one's faith? Not necessarily. It can be one thing to no longer believe in something, but it can be something quite different to lose one's faith. To cease believing in a set of faith propositions doesn't necessarily equate with losing one's faith. Indeed, the loss of one's belief system is often the condition for a purified faith.

How is belief different from faith? In normal, everyday parlance to say that we believe something to be true means that we are able to square that truth with our imagination, that is, we are able to somehow circumscribe it imaginatively so that it makes sense to us. Conversely, if we cannot picture how something might make sense then it is a short step to say that it isn't true. Our beliefs are predicated on what we can square with our imagination and our thinking.

But many of the objects of our faith are, in essence and by definition, unimaginable, ineffable, and beyond conceptualization. Hence in the area of faith, to say that I can't believe this or that is generally more an indication of the limitation of our imagination and our rational powers than it is indicative of the loss of faith. I believe that we are much more agnostic about our beliefs than we are agnostic about God, and this isn't a loss of faith.

Faith is deeper than belief, and it is not always something we can picture imaginatively inside our minds. Take, for instance, a number of articles in the *Apostles' Creed*: It is impossible to imagine them as true in terms of picturing them as real. They are real, but our images of them are only icons. That is true too of many articles within our Christian creed and many of our written doctrines of faith. As expressed, they are merely images and words that point us towards something which we cannot imagine because it is beyond imagination.

For example: The first thing, always, that needs to be said about God is that God is ineffable, that is, God is beyond all conceptualization, beyond all imaginings, beyond being pictured, and beyond being captured in any adequate way by language. This is also true for our understanding of Christ as the Second Person in the Trinity. Jesus was God's son, but how can that to be imagined or pictured? It can't be. How can God, who is one, be three? This isn't mathematics; it's mystery, something that cannot be imaginatively circumscribed. Yet, we believe it and millions and millions of people for two thousand years have risked their lives and their souls on its truth without being able to picture it imaginatively. Faith is a knowing of something which, because of its magnitude and infinity, cannot be adequately pictured in terms of an imaginative construct. Our words about it express our beliefs and those words point to the reality, but they are not the reality.

To reject a specific piece of art does not mean we reject beauty. So when someone says, *I can no longer believe this*, he is in effect rejecting a set of propositions, a set of particular icons and a theory of art (a theology), rather than actually rejecting belief in God, and he is rejecting it precisely because he cannot imaginatively picture something which in fact cannot be pictured.

It has been said that atheist is just another name for someone who cannot get metaphor. Perhaps that's too simple, but it does suggest that rejecting a set of theological propositions is not the same thing as losing one's faith.




Math- In math, we are solving quadratic equations by factoring, completing the square, and the quadratic formula.



RESCUE / RECYCLE RELIGIOUS ITEMS MINISTRY

Have you wondered what to do with religious items that you no longer want to use or keep? There is a "Rescue and Recycle Program for Religious Items" ministry at St. Raymond's Parish. This ministry was started some years ago by Ruth Hauswirth as a resource for people to be able to re-purpose their religious items that are no longer being used. In past years, thousands of items have been donated and re-purposed. All items are treated in a respectful manner by going to those people or organizations who would again have use for them. The Rescue Ministry will take any type of Catholic religious items: religious statues in any condition, pictures, medals, rosaries, crucifix's, holy cards, blessed candles, scapulars, religious books, holy water/holy oils, Saint relics, Catholic books, cd's or dvd's, and unwanted jewelry (beads and jewelry will be re-purposed and made into rosaries). Items that are broken but fixable are also accepted but we cannot accept Mass or greeting cards from religious organizations. Rescue items that you would like to donate can be brought to the PMC.
