Dear St. Raymond Parishioners,

It's been nearly 30 years since the fall of the Berlin wall (November 1989). I remember it vividly as a third year theologian at Mundelein. There amid the clamor of instability a great hope and possibility surged in dismantling the wall that was an iconic symbol of tyranny. This was not simply a scar from a section of East Germany and Eastern Europe but a painful reminder of the 60 plus years of war, violence, domination and political betrayal that was a darkness upon Europe and most of the world. Young people chiseled away at a concrete fortress that was erected to isolate a group of people from the world. In the air was a fresh beginning, a new hope for a possible future. Funny how things happen. In the 90's the internet came into prominence alongside new relationships and partnerships creating a new vision.... and just like that we pushed the boundaries and became 'global.' History teaches us many lessons.

Within scripture and tradition we also find great hope and possibility. God gives us direction and often the tools to recreate the world. The Pentecost moment stretched the Body of Christ beyond Jerusalem to proclaim a message to all the nations! Jesus is risen. Jesus offers salvation. Jesus is Lord. These ancient assertions and titles were subversive to the climate of the day, particularly claiming Jesus is Lord.

One insight I offer this day, that what guided the early church and **should** guide us in our continued living is courage and unity. Courage to stand and speak a bold message, a message that is a conviction at the heart of who we are and profess to believe. Secondly, the unity of the Spirit helps us to recognize one common experience of one God in Jesus, one faith and one baptism. The faith we share puts us in touch with our deepest humanity, to live and share with others. The scope is universal while at the same time unites ourselves together in a bond as brothers and sisters sharing all good gifts.

In light of current trends in religion and the larger world we have become silent and bland to the world that is being shaped for us. Several months ago an initiative was formed by many Christian religious leaders to speak up and have our churches claim Jesus and his teaching as the moral voice and guide for our congregations. We recite our Creed each week at Mass and have renewed our Baptismal promises aloud throughout this Easter season, but how do those promises inform our beliefs and actions in this contemporary world?

The Holy Spirit is here for our needs. The Spirit is here to strengthen us in our families, our marriages and caring for all the poor and sick brothers and sisters. The Spirit is here each step of the way---all we have to do is say yes. In our acceptance we give glory to God, our world is renewed and transformed. In some ways our parish has been renewed by this grace of the Spirit. It was started by people who believed a long time ago that our church not only could be a better place, but that being strangers, having different languages and cultures would never be barriers to friendship, love and living as brothers and sisters in Jesus.

## Pentecost



Easter time, of course, begins with the feast of Easter itself and lasts for 50 days, ending with Pentecost (Greek pente'koste: "fiftieth") and it's this feast we celebrate next week. We need to understand it in the context of the Jewish feast *Shavout*, also called the Feast of Weeks, a full season of seven weeks of thanksgiving beginning with Passover Sabbath. It's a festival that celebrated the theme of harvest and thanksgiving, or the "first fruits" of the spring planting.

By the end of the second century, Christians were observing a similar 50-day festival of rejoicing after the annual *Pascha* (Easter). People prayed and fasting was prohibited. Most likely, the early followers of Jesus continued to observe the Jewish festival with the "first fruits" theme, rather than a distinctly new theme. Fasting and kneeling were forbidden because of the joyful experience of the resurrection.

By the late 4<sup>th</sup> century, the feast of the Ascension was celebrated in some parts of the church on the 40<sup>th</sup> day after Easter. Originally, this feast of the ending of Jesus' visible presence among his followers seems to have been observed as part of the outpouring of the spirit on the 50<sup>th</sup> day. In many dioceses of the United States, including ours, the Feast of the Ascension has been moved to Sunday and replaces the 7<sup>th</sup> Sunday of Easter.

The weekdays between Ascension and Pentecost are a preparation period for the outpouring of the Spirit upon the first community of those who believed that Jesus was the Lord and Christ. Therefore, the feast of Pentecost celebrates the "first fruits of the Holy Spirit", the beginning and flowering of the Church and its mission through the ongoing work of the Holy Spirit. It was and is visible and tangible like Christ's Body! We continue to build up the Church through the ongoing power of the Spirit. Jesus' Spirit draws near and raises up ministers and leaders to continue in this work. We pray for those who work in the Lord's vineyard as liturgical ministers, catechists, advocates for the poor and displaced, parents and young people who continue to discern God's call to serve others.

In many European countries the day of rejoicing marked by sharing in the bounty of what the earth has brought forth, creating festive wreaths with spring grasses and flowers. Many share this day by eating foods that have come forth from the earth. In this part of the world it is the strawberry or apricot. So today share in the joy of the Holy Spirit that has yielded many splendid gifts and fruits. Taste and see the goodness of the Lord! Psalm 34



# An Extraordinary Book

Dorothy Day is alleged to have said: Don't call me a saint; I don't want to be dismissed that easily! A new biography on her by her granddaughter, Kate Hennessy, *Dorothy Day – The World will be saved by Beauty: An Intimate Portrait of my Grandmother*, will, I believe, go a long way in preventing anyone from turning Dorothy Day, soon to officially canonized by the church, into what she feared, a plaster-saint who can be piously doted-upon and then not taken seriously.

We're all, I'm sure, familiar with who Dorothy Day was and what her life's work was about. Indeed, Pope Francis in addressing the US Congress, singled out four Americans who, he suggests, connected spirituality to a life of service in an extraordinary way: Abraham Lincoln, Martin Luther King, Thomas Merton, and Dorothy Day. This new biography gives us an honest picture of who this remarkable woman actually was.

This book is extraordinary for a number of reasons: Kate Hennessy is a very good writer, the book is the product of years of research, she's Dorothy's granddaughter and had a very close and special relationship with her, and she manages in telling Dorothy's story to keep both a healthy critical and aesthetic distance. Her insight is both privileged and rare, privileged because of her intimate relationship with Dorothy and rare because most authors who are that intimately tied to their subject cannot maintain a balanced critical distance. Hennessy admits that doing this was no easy task: "That is the danger of holiness on your own doorstep, in your own family. Either you cannot see it for the view is too close, or if you do, you feel you haven't a chance of being the person she was. You feel it is a sad mistake that you are related."

And that combination makes for an extraordinary book that lets us see a side of Dorothy Day we would never see otherwise. Beyond this being a close-up of Dorothy Day, Hennessy shares stories about some of the key people surrounding Dorothy: Her relationship to the man who fathered her child, Forster Battenham, with whom she maintained a life-long friendship. Hennessy's biography shatters the myth that upon her conversion Dorothy coldly and forever turned her back upon this man. Not true. They remained close their whole lives and Foster, until her death, remained an intimate companion and a faithful supporter.

Central too to this biography is the story of Dorothy's daughter, Tamar, who, while vitally important in Dorothy's life, is unfairly absent in virtually everything that's known about Dorothy in the popular mind. Tamar's story, which holds its own richness and is not incidental to the history of the Catholic worker, is critical to understanding Dorothy Day. There's no understanding of Dorothy without understanding her daughter's story and that of her grandchildren. To understand Dorothy Day you also have to see her as a mother and grandmother.

Hennessy shares how, when her diaries were opened some years after Dorothy's death, Tamar initially was bitterly resistant to having them released for publication and how that resistance was only lifted when, thanks to the man who transcribed them, Robert Ellsberg, the family and Tamar herself realized that her resistance was rooted in the fact that Dorothy's diaries themselves were unfair in their neglect of Tamar's story and the role of her story within the bigger narrative of Dorothy's life, work, and legacy.

The book is a story too of some of the people who played key roles in founding the Catholic Worker: Peter Maurin, Stanley Vishnewski, and Ade Bethune.

This isn't a story that follows the classical genre for the lives of the saints, where form is often exaggerated to highlight essence and the result is an over-idealization that paints the saint into an icon. Hennessy highlights that Dorothy's faith wasn't a faith that never doubted and which walked on water. What Dorothy never doubted was what faith calls us to: hospitality, non-violence, and service to the poor. In these things, Dorothy was single-minded enough to be a saint and that manifested itself in her dogged perseverance so that at end she could say: "The older I get the more I feel that faithfulness and perseverance are the greatest virtues – accepting the sense of failure we all must have in our work, in the work of others around us, since Christ was the world's greatest failure."

That being said, her life was messy, many of her projects were often in crisis, she was forever over-extended, and, in her granddaughter's words: "She was fierce, dictatorial, controlling, judgmental, and often angry, and she knew it. It took the Catholic Worker, her own creation, to teach her her lessons."

This is hagiography as it should be written. It tells the story of how a very human person, caught-up in the foibles, weaknesses, and mess that beset us all, can, like St. Brigid, cast her cloak upon a sunbeam and see it spread until it brings abundance and beauty to the entire countryside.
