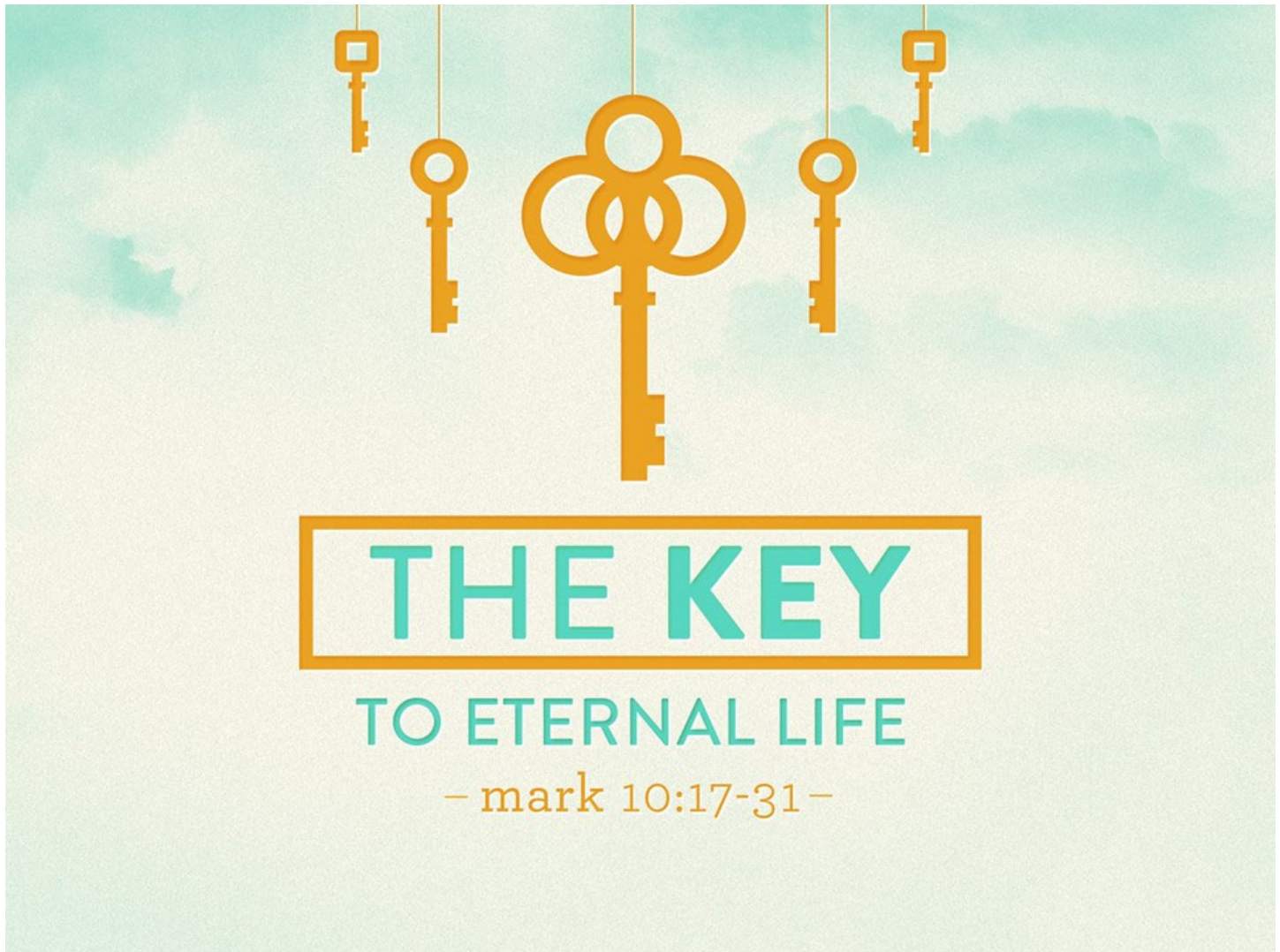

From the Summit Looking forward

Last week I had the opportunity to be a part of the Archdiocesan gathering at the Rosemont Convention center. This 'convention,' is part of the Renew My Church initiative that is helping reshape and transform our Local Church and all its agencies, namely our parishes, within communities like Mount Prospect. Fittingly called the Summit, we had a chance to walk together and envision a new horizon for this local church. Here is my take away, as I can only speak for myself. Lorelei Mc Dermott and the group compiled some notes that are also in the bulletin.

I think it's the best event I have experienced in 28 years of priesthood. I say that with humility because I experienced many cool events in my life and as a priest. What I mean, this is the first time pastors and associates, deacons, staff and parishioners, diocesan personnel, religious, women and men came together and actively searched for a direction together. We prayed together and for each other. We struggled to get beyond our current landlocked mentality of parish. We lifted each other up to renew our commitment to Jesus and to find hope in a difficult ecclesial and social landscape. I found myself breathing in a new Spirit that all can be possible because of common baptism together.

Why do I say this? First, I recognize the wonderful folks from our parish that attended and are doing wonderful and dedicated service. Second, I also met people from all walks of life and communities who are doing great things! I met people, who I once knew, in Polish, Hispanic or African American communities who are engaged in ministry. I met a former high school classmate who is helping his parish and working in prison ministry at Cook County. I was embraced by a former student of mine who is working with youth to stop the violence on the South side. I was happy to see a young woman I sponsored for ecclesial training is now serving on councils for youth and faith formation. The Spirit of Jesus is alive! The spirit is helping us push forward from maintaining our communities to communities in mission. For me that is a key step.

Some other worthy notes. As you may have noticed our parking lot is repaved. The final work will be this weekend and hopefully we will not have to attend to it for another 10 years. (Yippee!!) As one committee member commented, "With the lights on the parking lot is gorgeous." (His words not mine) He must have a larger romantic vocabulary for his loving wife!

Also, a video security system is being installed in the parking lot and around several entrances around the Church. New LED Lights have been installed and the poles will be refinished and painted. All of these projects are scheduled to be completed before October 25th. These projects are made possible by the generous contributions to our To Teach Who Christ Is / Sharing Our Faith Securing Our Future campaign. I am excited that we can upgrade our facilities and keep them properly maintained for current and future use. Thank you for your generosity and thanks to the committee who instrumental in making all this possible.

Renew My Church Summit, Maintenance to Mission

Over 2,000 people attended the archdiocesan Renew My Church Summit on October 1st and 2nd, 2018 in Rosemont. St. Raymond has been grouped with St. Zachary, St. Cecilia and the Hispanic Ministry of Mount Prospect, but our grouping is not expected to be activated for a year or more. The Summit was hopeful and set as a goal to recreate and rediscover and burst open the church doors to welcome people in.

Cardinal Cupich opened the meeting by reminding us that all of us are responsible for the mission of the church. "You are no less responsible than people who wear a collar." We need to reach out to people who have been hurt or marginalized and listen to those who are both unchurched and dechurched. The goal of Renew My Church is to transform nominal Catholics into super evangelists – to follow the Great Commission to **GO AND MAKE DISCIPLES**.

Fr. James Mallon, from Halifax, Canada, was the featured speaker at the Summit. Fr. Mallon's book, ***Divine Renovation***, shares the story of evangelizing to people **who have never encountered Christ** in order to make new disciples – students of Jesus. Disciples renew the church through learning, serving and giving. Disciples then capture a missionary identity to become apostles – those sent. Following Jesus' call, "As the Father has sent me, so I send you." Fr. Mallon's further thoughts:

- ♦ What is one gift that God has given you? Minister to your strengths!
- ♦ Agnostics and atheists are evangelizing! We must counter by intentionally sharing our faith life.
- ♦ We are all busy, but we find the time for things we want to do.
- ♦ Faith and hope is not a strategy. Instead, give an experience of the heart of Jesus.
- ♦ The current model of Christendom is dying. Only 18% of Chicagoland Catholics attend Mass.
- ♦ We must strive to be missionary disciples, making Christ the center of our lives and learning to let go of our need to do only what is familiar.
- ♦ How do we know what our parish values are? Look to see where the parish spends its time and money.
- ♦ Ask the Lord to be our hope and strength – to free us from hurt and fear and cynicism.
- ♦ We don't need an incremental change. **We need a transformational change.**

How many people have you brought to Jesus Christ? Are we bearing fruit in the form of changed lives? When someone has a transformational experience with Jesus Christ and decides to follow – that is a new disciple! We prayed for the Holy Spirit to guide us towards a new church that is vibrant and alive.

An Invitation to Reclaim the Good News of Jesus

On Pentecost Sunday, a statement of beliefs to Reclaim the Good News of Jesus at this time in the history of our nation was published in the bulletin and affirmed by members of our parish staff and council.

That Statement of Beliefs is now posted in the narthex. As the faith community of St. Raymond, you also are invited to affirm these beliefs by signing the book so that together we might find a common voice to speak to the challenges of our time.

1. WE BELIEVE each human being is made in God's image and likeness. (Genesis 1:26)
THEREFORE WE SHALL treat all people with respect from conception until natural death.
2. WE BELIEVE we are one body. (Galatians 3:28)
THEREFORE WE SHALL welcome, protect and bless all races, genders, classes, orientations and faiths.
3. WE BELIEVE how we treat the hungry, the thirsty, the naked, the stranger, the sick and the prisoner is how we treat Christ himself. (Matthew 25: 31-46)
THEREFORE WE SHALL uphold and care for the vulnerable in our midst, drawing people close through Christian hospitality.
4. WE BELIEVE that truth is morally central to our personal and public lives. (John 14:6)
THEREFORE WE SHALL uphold truth-telling in our culture, beginning with our children and families.
5. WE BELIEVE that Christ's way of leadership is servanthood, not domination. (Matthew 20:25-26)
THEREFORE WE SHALL support democracy not because we believe in human perfection, but because we do not.
6. WE BELIEVE Jesus when he tells us to go into all nations making disciples. (Matthew 28:18-19)
THEREFORE WE SHALL live in awareness of the needs of the global community.
7. WE BELIEVE the Eucharist is the body and blood of Christ and that we are called to be nurtured each week at the table of the Lord. (John 6:48-51)
THEREFORE WE SHALL honor the Sabbath as a day to rest with our family in our Lord.

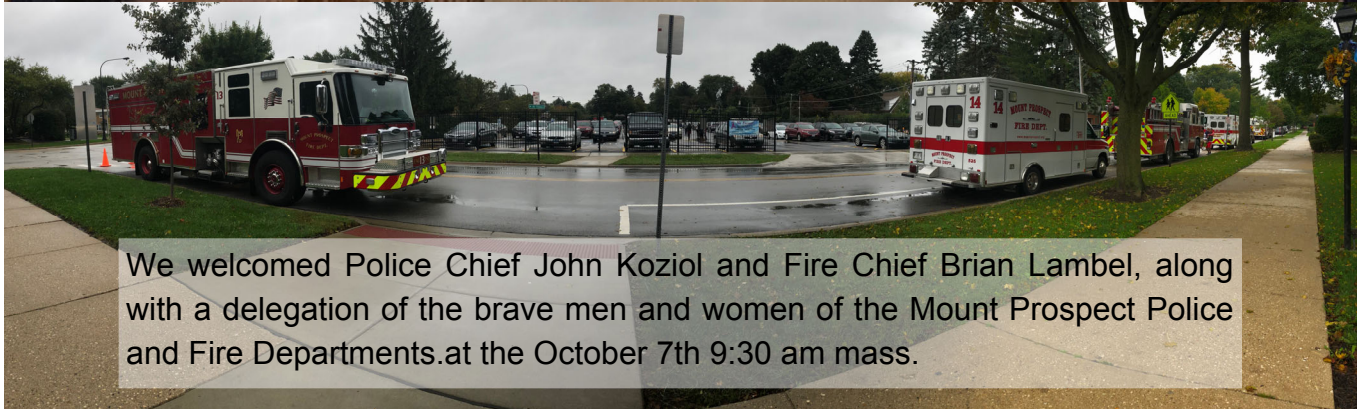

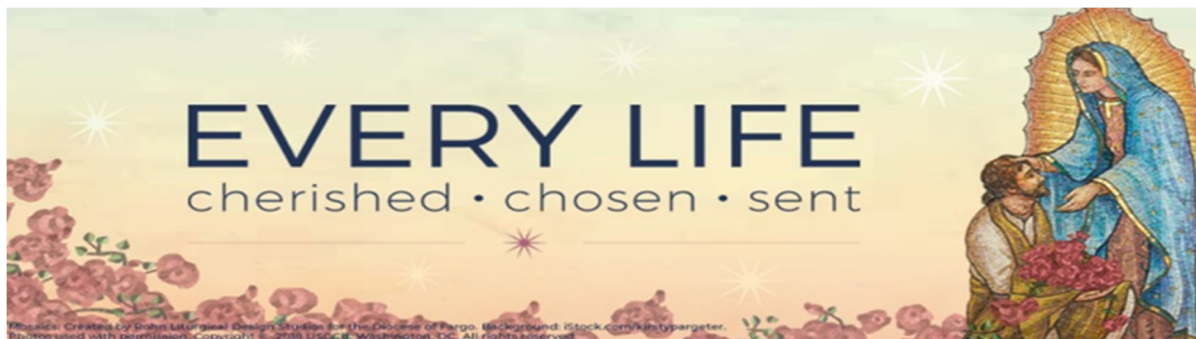

In 1531, when the indigenous people of Mexico were subjugated and the practice of human sacrifice was a recent memory, the Mother of God appeared to St. Juan Diego as a pregnant native woman, now known as our Lady of Guadalupe.

She sent him with miraculous flowers in his cloak to tell the bishop to build a church where people could receive her Son and her loving, tender care. When St. Juan Diego opened his cloak before the bishop, an image of our Lady was revealed that remains to this day.

"Will my dog go to heaven?" When **Pope Francis** was asked this question by a child, the Pope responded "yes!" This is **not** a **frivolous question**. The answer that each one of us would give to that question is grounded in how we understand the very **nature** of our **God**. It also reflects our understanding of God's compassion. How inclusive is God's love? How inclusive is God's saving grace? And what might it mean to **"be saved?"** Many of us learned that God the Father sent Jesus to die on the cross in order to "open the gates of heaven" and "save us from our sins." But there are other perspectives in the Gospels. There are other ways of thinking about this – in light of all we know about the expansiveness and creativity of the universe and what Scripture reveals to us about God's own expansive, creative, inclusive, compassionate love. Does God's gracious, salvific love include all of **God's beloved creation?** And what difference does that make in **our own lives?**

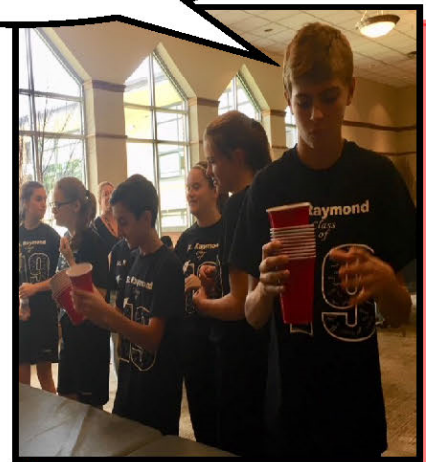

The Book of the Prophet Isaiah

All women and men of the parish are invited to join the Tuesday Morning Scripture Group for **five weeks** this Fall. We will begin studying and praying the Book of the **Prophet Isaiah**. Other than the Book of Psalms, this book of the Old Testament is most **frequently quoted** in the **New Testament**. It continues to have an important role in both **Judaism** and **Christianity**. As we'll see, the prophet is very good at reading the "**signs of the times**," which both Martin Luther and **Vatican II** encouraged Christians to do! Martin Luther said that when we pray, we should do so with the Bible in one hand and the newspaper in the other! As we reflect on Isaiah, we'll be both **challenged** and **affirmed** by the prophet. 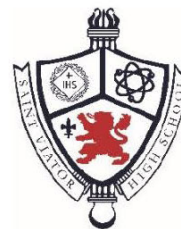
