

The Night Watch

Stay with me, remain here with me. Watch and pray. Watch and pray.

This year we as a parish introduce the Night Watch, which will begin after the Holy Thursday service and will continue through the night until the next evening on Good Friday, with the Burial of the Lord. At all hours we keep watch with Jesus as he endures his passion, death and resurrection. We remember Jesus words to his disciples in the garden of Gethsemane "Stay awake with me and pray." Matthew 26, 37-46

What is needed? Two or more volunteers will maintain the watch in silent prayer for a one-hour shift. Every hour the minister team will change. Interested volunteer ministers will be able to sign up on the Night Watch schedule, which will be located in the narthex beginning on the weekend of March 23/24, until it is filled. Please sign up as families or as groups to keep watch with Christ. As you can imagine the most demanding times to fill will be 1am-6am Friday.

Why we do this? This is truly a parish event. It involves all of us to continue these days in prayer and fasting, for our needs and the needs of this world. These three days (Triduum) commemorate the salvation of the world through Jesus in his cross and resurrection. As we walk with Christ, as we unite to him, we as a church Passover from death to new life. There will be dedicated places to focus our prayers (shrine) in church during and after the services.

Also this year, at 10 PM on Holy Thursday, only the chapel outer entrance located on Lincoln Street will remain open for access to the church throughout the Night Watch. The Eucharistic Prayer Chapel will remain closed during the Triduum, since the reserved Eucharist is not available (only to the sick and special services) and tabernacle inaccessible until a new consecration during the Easter Vigil. We come together to practice prayer, fasting and almsgiving—and by doing so we help lift families and communities out of poverty and put them on a path toward resilience, prosperity and stability. Each week during Lent, we have the opportunity to be inspired by the stories of communities from around the world, to set aside a little of ourselves to make room for a stranger. Corresponding to our rights, we all have duties and responsibilities to one another, our families and the larger society.

ENCOUNTER KUMBA

Waisa didn't spend a single day in school. When she was young, no one thought girls should receive an ed1ucation. Plus, there was work to do. She helped her twelve siblings at her family's farm. She was responsible for helping her mom sell meat to their neighbors.

Now, things have changed in Sinkunia, a town in the north of Sierra Leone. Waisa knows the importance of education—especially for girls. "If there's education, Sierra Leone will develop," she says. "Our students will make sure of it."

That's why Waisa insists that her 12-year-old grand-daughter, Kumba, attends the nearby CRS-sponsored school, so she can learn how to make a difference in her community and her country. And, through the nutritious lunch that CRS gives to each student every day, Kumba and her classmates can focus on their studies and not on their hunger.

Kumba's favorite subject is math because she likes the challenge. And when she completes her education, she wants to be a nurse. A nurse, Kumba says, helps cure the sick, and if there were more nurses in Sinkunia, those who get sick wouldn't have to leave the town to get healthcare.

Waisa is proud of her granddaughter and continues to work hard to support her. With no shade from the hot sun, Waisa cares for the family's garden, watering eggplants, tomatoes, onions and more to be harvested and sold through the streets of Sinkunia. Kumba helps, too, visiting the garden every day after school.

"I'm happy if I can support my daughters and grand-daughters, even through university," Waisa says. With a smile, she adds, "I know that educated girls help their parents and their communities."

SHARE THE JOURNEY

A good education doesn't just benefit the student. It benefits the family, the community, and the common good, allowing individuals to flourish without needing to leave home.

FACTS TO CONSIDER Population: 6,163,195

Size: 71,740 square miles; slightly smaller than South Carolina

- After a 10-year civil war in the 1990s, CRS projects in Sierra Leone are helping to rebuild the country with a focus on integrating peacebuilding.
- Rates of child and maternal mortality are high, levels of education are low, and, despite rich resource endowments and abundant land, more than 60 percent of Sierra Leoneans live on less than \$1.25 a day.
- The Ebola outbreak in Sierra Leone in 2014 was the worst the world has seen, covering the entire country and causing thousands of deaths. CRS was one of the organizations on the front lines controlling the outbreak.

THROUGH OUR ALMS WE TOUCH THE WORLD



Cows Against Malaria Project was set up three years ago to raise funds to fight the plague of malaria, a deadly disease common in tropical areas around the world, especially among the poor and rural people of eastern Africa. On medical missionary trips to Uganda, Deacon Don Grossnickle (from Our Lady of the Wayside) witnessed the suffering and death of infants and new mothers vulnerable to malaria, and other diseases, but who lacked even basic prenatal and neonatal healthcare. While medication for treatment of malaria is available, it is costly, and not available through the Ugandan government. Only the affluent there have access to this medication. Malaria is the leading cause of death in Uganda, accounting for over 27% of deaths. Uganda has the world's highest malaria incidence, with a rate of 478 cases per 1,000 population per year.

Cows Against Malaria is a project of Microfinance Alliance Africa Projects Foundation (a 501c3) whose mission is to save lives and promote the health and wellness of poor villagers, especially babies and mothers, in Uganda and other East African nations most vulnerable to the deadly disease of malaria. MAAPF raises funds here, and then provides grants and loans to parishes in various dioceses in Uganda for a variety of sustainable solutions and projects to fight malaria and conditions that strike babies and their mothers. Many MAAPF projects provide for the use of livestock and farming to build sustainability. Ultimately, these projects provide medicine and basic equipment for small, storefront clinics that save lives.

One project model creates a network of mini family-owned dairy farms with training, direction, and the loan of a pregnant heifer. Each cohort family commits to giving back the first female calf born to their cow, and makes an additional commitment to tithe back 10% of their milk proceeds for a small clinic to provide malaria medication and basic healthcare services, as well as prenatal and pediatric services to mothers and children of the village. The cost of each cow, plus training and support service for each recipient family is \$800. Currently three cohorts have been funded by donations to **CAMP**.

Another malaria clinic for mothers and children in Nakifuma, Uganda, benefitted directly from alms donated by St. Raymond de Penafort Parish during Lent 2018. The St. Raymond alms provided that clinic staff with a piggery, the proceeds of which now supplies malaria medication for the families they serve.

Our St. Raymond Lenten almsgiving for the weekends of **March 31**, **April 7**, **and April 14**, **2019** will go toward providing the training, direction, and livestock needed for the next **Cows Against Malaria** cohorts, and resources for other life-saving projects being planned.



helping many Veterans.




LEADERSHIP CLUB

For those of you who use the hearing aid loop system in the church, know that a technician from the company that installed the loop recently came and inspected our system and made some adjustments to the settings. It was determined that the loop is currently working as it should in 3 out of the 4 sections of pews in church, the two center sections and the south section (parallel to the Holy Family statue). It is advised that if you are using the hearing aid loop, do not sit in the section on the north side of church (parallel to the music area), as you will not get as clear of a signal. Thank you.

THE AFGHAN MAKERS GROUP



Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

With this letter I write to you about a development that should disturb us greatly, both as citizens and as disciples of Jesus, the Lord of life.

Recently, two bills have been introduced in the Illinois House and Senate. The first, House Bill 2495 and Senate Bill 1942, both identical pieces of legislation, seeks to strip unborn persons of any protection – or even consideration – under the law and declare abortion to be a "fundamental right" and matter of health care. The end result is that an abortion could be obtained at any stage of pregnancy, including late term, for any reason and without any regulation. The law would no longer guarantee any modicum of humanity or compassion for any unborn person in Illinois, even if they are partially born. This legislation also repeals the Abortion Performance Refusal Act, which protects doctors, nurses and hospitals who refuse to permit, recommend, perform or assist in abortion. In so doing, rights of conscience, especially religious objections, will be lost.

The second piece of legislation House Bill 2467 and its identical Senate Bill 1594, repeals the Illinois Parental Notice of Abortion Act. This law, upheld unanimously by the Illinois Supreme Court just six years ago, has the common-sense purpose of ensuring that parents would be part of the life-altering decision of their minor child in the case she seeks an abortion. This effective law has reduced abortions performed on minors by fifty-seven percent.

As citizens of a state and people of faith who care about the common good, I urge you to join me and my brother bishops in an effort to defeat this radical departure from current law and practice in our state. Please reach out your State Representative and Senator to urge defeat of these bills. The Seamless Garment Ministry has some very important information to share with you...

There are two very aggressive and extreme bills being introduced in Illinois's General Assembly. If these laws pass it will be a devastating blow to our State and Country. No one stands to gain anything from these - they are not going to protect children, families, parents and most of all women. Please take a few minutes to read the following info.

Laws HB 2467: Parent Notice Abortion Repeal and HB 2495: Reproductive Health Act are being introduced into our General Assembly and will likely pass unless we as Catholics who respect life make a stand. Both these laws will cancel the current laws our state has to protect life and families.

Here's what these bills will do:

- 1. Remove all limits on late-term abortions. Abortion, up to the moment of birth, for any reason or no reason at all, will be allowed
- 2. Remove any parental involvement in an underage girl's abortion
- 3. Remove all licensing requirements and health and safety standards for abortion clinics, including lateterm abortion clinics
- 4. Allow non-doctors to perform abortions and allow women to obtain abortion pills (medical abortions) without a physician's prescription
- 5. Force all insurance plans to cover abortions, with no exception for churches, religious organizations, or pro-life groups.
- 6. Expressly declare that the unborn child has no rights.
- 7. Remove conscience protections from pro-life doctors, nurses, and hospitals who refuse to participate in abortions.
- 8. Eliminate the requirement that abortion numbers be reported publicly, so that the additional number of abortions, or the number of abortions done on outof-state women or underage girls, will not be made public

Here's what you can do:


