Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

Muscular endurance is the component of physical fitness that enables us to continue to perform actions that we need to engage over a longer period of time without wearing out. A person could possess great muscular strength, but lack endurance. In the spiritual life, it is **PRAYING** that is our capacity for endurance and perseverance over a lifetime of challenges.

As muscular endurance requires the development of all the muscle groups working together, so praying requires a communal effort. In the Bible, the ideal of the Bible is never simply individual, but always communal. Jesus says: *Where two or three are gathered together in my name, there I am in the midst of them.* (Matthew 18:20) This is true because prayer is the expression of love that most conforms us to the image of Jesus. Jesus begins his mission in retreat in the desert, in which his relationship with the Father is tested and strengthened in prayer. Jesus teaches us to pray to God as Our Father with the same confidence. The honesty of Jesus' prayer, and the honesty of his favorite prayers - the Psalms - show us that we can be totally open with our feelings in prayer. The Father wants to hear from us. The last words of Jesus are words of prayer for others and for the completion of his mission in service to others. Jesus' praying in the desert and praying on the cross shows us that prayer does not require any particular conditions. In fact, the most powerful prayer often arises out of conditions that are less than ideal.

Authentic prayer is always communal; an act of solidarity. First, we pray in solidarity with the risen Jesus himself. Scripture emphasizes that the power of our prayer is found most fundamentally in the fact that we pray in Jesus' name, and that Jesus is interceding for us at all times (Romans 8:33-34; Hebrews 7:25; 1 John 2:1-2). In prayer, the Holy Spirit unites us with Jesus in prayer to the Father. (Romans 8:26-27)

Second, we pray in solidarity with the whole communion of saints, both visible and invisible. We pray together to OUR Father, as Jesus taught us. It has always been part of Catholic tradition that we can ask for the intercession of particular saints, especially Mary, the most perfected of the saints. But even the power of the intercession of individual saints comes from the fact that the saints always pray in unity-in communion with one another.


Third, we intercede for another in prayer amid the struggles of life lived day to day. An "intercessor" is a "go-between." We go to God on behalf of others in solidarity with them. An "intercessor" is a "reconciler." We pray that our relationships with one another will be reconciled with God's will for us - brought into harmony with God's will. Pope Francis speaks often about this: "One form of prayer moves us particularly to take up the task of evangelization and to seek the good of others; it is the prayer of intercession... Intercessory prayer does not divert us from true contemplation, since authentic contemplation always has a place for others. This attitude becomes a prayer of gratitude to God for others... The great men and women of God were great intercessors. Intercession is like a leaven in the heart of the Trinity. It is a way of penetrating the Father's heart and discovering new dimensions which can shed light on concrete situations and change them." (*Evangelii gaudium* 281-283)

Francis recalls Jesus' words about leaven: *The kingdom of heaven is like yeast that a woman took and mixed with three measures of wheat flour until the whole batch was leavened.* (Matthew 13:33) Our mission depends on the constant leavening process of our communal prayer together, wherever and whenever we are moved by the Holy Spirit to pray. Francis reminds us that all authentic prayer is Eucharistic. It is an expression of thanksgiving to God for the blessings of our lives, especially for those God has placed in our life journey.

All this reminds us that the challenges of our current situation of social distancing are no match for the power of prayer. Indeed, these challenges can expand and deepen our prayer if we are open to it. This can be an opportunity to develop a regular discipline of prayer - spiritual exercise - if we are not already doing it. The beauty of the Catholic tradition is that it offers a rich variety of ways and styles of praying that are all valid, and all express different facets of the precious gem of our spiritual life as the light of Jesus shines upon it. Jesus says: *The one who has been instructed in the kingdom is like the head of household who brings from his storeroom both the new and the old.* (Matthew 13:52) So there are ancient ways to pray which come to us from tradition, and there are new ways to pray that arise in each generation as the Holy Spirit inspires the People of God.

Admonish the idle, cheer the fainthearted, support the weak, be patient with all. See that no one returns evil for evil. Always seek what is good for each other and for all. Rejoice always. Pray without ceasing. In all circumstances give thanks, for this is the will of God for you in Christ Jesus. (1 Thessalonians 5:14-18)

Dear St. Raymond Family:

All pastors have been informed that the guidelines for sacramental celebrations issued by the Archdiocese of Chicago will remain in place until May 30, 2020 in accordance with guidelines issued by the governor of Illinois.

We appreciate your patience and cooperation with these guidelines. It is essential that we all remain united in our efforts to protect every human life.

The following is a summary of the current guidelines as stated by the Vicar General of the Archdiocese of Chicago.

- All churches and adoration chapels must be closed and locked until the order is lifted by the governor. Private prayer in any parish building must be discontinued until the order is lifted.
- There can be no gatherings anywhere on parish/school property, nor can any parish personnel be involved in organizing them on any other site.
- All weddings and baptisms must be postponed and can be re-scheduled once the order is lifted. There are no exceptions to this, regardless of the size of the group. However, permission can be given for baptism in case of an extreme emergency.
- Funerals and wakes must be postponed until the order is lifted. Burials at Catholic Cemeteries may continue: however, attendance limit and social distancing requirements apply per below. There are two options for funeral celebrations:
 - (1) A funeral service, not a Mass, may take place at the funeral home the limit for attendees remains 10 people at this time (inclusive of the funeral director, priest, mourners, etc.). All attendees must practice social distancing.
 - (2) A funeral service may take place graveside at the cemetery before committal/burial. The limit for attendees remains 10 people at this time (inclusive of the funeral director, priest, mourners, etc.). All attendees must practice social distancing.
- Individual confessions are currently not possible; this includes virtual or phone confessions, which are never permissible, nor drive-thru confessions. In keeping with longstanding pastoral practice when penitents' access to the sacrament is restricted, they can be assured that their sins are forgiven if they make an act of contrition with a firm resolve to approach the Sacrament of Reconciliation after the stay-at-home order is lifted.
- Under the State of Illinois exemption for essential services, the Archdiocese of Chicago is including anointing of the sick as an essential service. However, out of an abundance of caution only a select number of priests will be allowed to administer this sacrament to any confirmed COVID-19 patients.

A Big Step In A Long Journey

Their journeys began more than three years ago when they left their homes and families in Africa.

Each journeyed alone, not knowing the other two existed even as they followed the same treacherous path from South America to the our southern border.

Those journeys finally converged at Viator House, where they became friends, lived, cooked and studied together with about 20 other young men for two-plus years - until last week when they moved into their first apartment.

Hard Work Pays Off

Congratulations to **Hanibal, Boureima and Samuel!** At Viator House they graduated from high school, refined their English, searched for and worked hard at local jobs - even as they remained committed to family back home who rely on the money they send monthly. **Hanibal and Boureima** even earned licenses and now own cars.

The Viator House Difference

Last week they began a new path together - just in time for **Boureima's** 21st birthday. **Boureima and Samuel** have landed new jobs at a medical supply company (*check out the garb below*), where Hanibal hopes to work while waiting to start as a mechanic at Arlington Heights Ford later this spring.

We're proud of them. And we're grateful for the drivers, tutors and mentors who've journeyed with them these last years. Some will continue journeying with them as the men hone skills for car maintenance, apartment-dwelling and monthly budgeting. We're grateful for each and every donor who insured we could provide them with food, shelter, school supplies and Ventra cards. Once again, **you - the Viator House Community** - prove that God is at work in Viator House - and you are the hands doing God's work in the lives of our participants.

Our new "renters" need your special prayers as they take this big step, as do **Rauf and Sadick**, two other participants planning to move into an apartment next month, and as does **Oscar**, who moved into an apartment last month to care for his little brother **Leonel**. Finally, also say a prayer for **Angel from Mexico**, who last week joined our community of 20 men from 12 countries.



We're Making More Lunches

As our response to this current crisis, Viator House staff members and participants are making lunches for Chicago day laborers, who are desperate for work and food at this time. 



Patients at Northwest Community Hospital

In late October we received word from the Spiritual Care Services Department at Northwest Community Hospital that they will no longer send the daily patient census to the Ministry of Care Coordinators at the parishes and other churches. Up to this time, Sr. Val received a confidential listing of St. Raymond parishioners at NCH, enabling us to offer the pastoral care that we want to provide for our parishioners experiencing illness requiring hospital care. Due to this change in policy, there is no way to know if any of our parishioners are at NCH.
