

(Continued from last week) Maintenance or mission?

Worship Many reams of paper have been spent on the issue why we as Catholics do not participate in Sunday worship or Mass. I don't want to add to that pile of words and voices, yet it is something that needs to be addressed, even in its complexity. How can we continue to foster our faith when most people in our community do not worship regularly on Sunday? We, as a parish, spend huge amount of resources on our liturgies (financial and ministerial) to make them beautiful, meaningful and worthy of praise. We, as a parish, have some of the most wonderful Sunday gatherings week after week and throughout the year, and they only get better. Yet our attendance is the same or less. Of course, this is not a numbers game of how many people are present in the pews, but honestly, it's asking why a good portion of the community is tuned-out.

It is truthful that many may choose not to come because of the church's stance on certain moral or social issues or because of the prevalent scandals that has absorbed the media. That is part of it; however, the decline in church attendance, here and throughout this local church in Chicago, has been going on since the 90s. Even then, while attendance was definitely higher, it often reflected a similar reality that more people do not participate than those who do. Those who do participate often are connected to their parish on a deeper level. Even so, if you get 25% of your community on Sunday, that is a big deal.

So, let's use 30% as a marker. And that is a reliable marker 20 years ago as well as today. Our community is roughly the same – yes, we lost quite a few individuals and families through aging or moving away. We also gained many new people along the way. Realistically, the Mount Prospect farmers market has more people attending on a Sunday than we do. Yes and there is the business and hectic pace of life. Sunday is the sabbath, a day to rest from work (not in bed) and all sorts of regular activities and re-energize and see the goodness and beauty of life. Research from all sorts of disciplines reflects that connection to family, rest and even prayer leads to a healthier and meaningful life.

If we are being honest, 30% is not that much. I offer this to you as a reflection: what if anyone of us gave 30% of ourselves in dedication to our work or our profession? What if we gave 30% as a commitment to the people we love, our marriages and children - would that be enough to satisfy and hold together these people and their lives? What if 30% is given to our responsibilities in caring for all that we devote to, such as our schooling, homes, the elderly or communities we live in - would they survive and flourish? I'm not sure, but it reflects a common trend similar to engagement in society or elections... very few care to go out and act. As Catholics, we are people of contemplation and action.

Our religious/spiritual practice of Sunday worship is the hub that helps us live out our commitments. The reality is

that when we do not have the people who are part of the community with us, they are missed and we are not the same. I believe we may have set-up a failure of our own, and made excuses for this absence, allowing it to be common practice. Furthermore, it leads to a disconnected life of being a disciple and community trying to live out its values. Imagine if we just spend 3 days of the week with our loved ones and believe that's family!

Let me provide an insight: a few years back, I was invited to a 50th wedding anniversary, and one young gentleman in his 40's approached me and stated, "You know Father Ed, I don't have to go to church." I listened. "I could go out in nature or near a tree and take a walk, and I could find God there." I agreed with him, and affirmed that he can, and I do too. Then I asked, "Well, when was the last time you did that?" He looked puzzled at me and said, "Do what? I don't do that!" This is not a judgment on my part or on others, but a viewpoint that we do not actually know what we are talking about, and convince ourselves that "my" Christian behavior is ok according to "me". Well that may address an aspect of our mental processing---it's my convenience that matters.

Similarly, many younger people do not attend and they crave a sense of community. They find it in other places and according to research they are seeking deeper connections and want to share their life. Their faith life, and expressions of it, are lived through activity and care for the world and poor. Is there something we can learn and create with young people that reveals a new sense of mission and communal worship? I think there is plenty of room to explore this.

Hence this leads to the crux of the point: We do not know Jesus. It's hard to verbalize this, but the trends and activity of our religious era point to it. If people knew Jesus, they would follow. What this reflects is not information about him or answers about faith---it's about knowing and living in him! This intersects with evangelization, discipleship and all the points I shared in Parish vitality. It seems to me that in various places we have fashioned or become comfortable with a Christian context based upon our personal satisfaction. I do not believe that is the core message of the gospel. People have to experience Jesus alive in their lives!

What do we do? Remember the sign, Explore God:We All Have Questions. It reminds me that Lent is about conversion, a changing that reflects a greater trust in God or growing closer to Jesus. That may be true for some of us. Yet, maybe the change we need is to risk our self-sufficient attitudes and preconceived notions about ourselves and let the Love of God, love us.

Consider being an active disciple, and share this bulletin with an individual or a family who might be trying to find their way back home to a new life, faith and community.

The Night Watch

Stay with me, remain here with me. Watch and pray. Watch and pray.

This year we as a parish introduce the Night Watch, which will begin after the Holy Thursday service and will continue through the night until the next evening on Good Friday, with the Burial of the Lord. At all hours we keep watch with Jesus as he endures his passion, death and resurrection. We remember Jesus words to his disciples in the garden of Gethsemane "Stay awake with me and pray." Matthew 26, 37-46

What is needed? Two or more volunteers will maintain the watch in silent prayer for a one-hour shift. Every hour the minister team will change. Interested volunteer ministers will be able to sign up on the Night Watch schedule, which will be located in the narthex beginning on the weekend of March 23/24, until it is filled. Please sign up as families or as groups to keep watch with Christ. As you can imagine the most demanding times to fill will be 1am-6am Friday.

Why we do this? This is truly a parish event. It involves all of us to continue these days in prayer and fasting, for our needs and the needs of this world. These three days (Triduum) commemorate the salvation of the world through Jesus in his cross and resurrection. As we walk with Christ, as we unite to him, we as a church Passover from death to new life. There will be dedicated places to focus our prayers (shrine) in church during and after the services.

Also this year, at 10 PM on Holy Thursday, only the chapel outer entrance located on Lincoln Street will remain open for access to the church throughout the Night Watch. The Eucharistic Prayer Chapel will remain closed during the Triduum, since the reserved Eucharist is not available (only to the sick and special services) and tabernacle inaccessible until a new consecration during the Easter Vigil. THROUGH OUR ALMS WE TOUCH THE WORLD



Join our entire St Raymond parish-wide 2019 Lenten Outreach! Our Catholic community in the United States does something amazing each Lent. We come together to practice prayer, fasting and almsgiving—and by doing so we help lift families and communities out of poverty and put them on a path toward resilience, prosperity and stability. That's the CRS Rice Bowl effect. Through this tradition, we have helped families around the world and in our own backyard by raising our voices and our prayers, and by making sacrificial gifts. Each week during Lent, we have the opportunity to be inspired by the stories of communities from around the world, to set aside a little of ourselves to make room for a stranger. This Lent, CRS Rice Bowl reminds us that the journey through the desert ultimately leads to resurrection—and that it is our Gospel call to stand with courage, bringing the hope of the Resurrection to a world often beset by hopelessness. Call to Family, Community and Participation

Humans are social by nature. We need each other. Like the early disciples, we are called to come together and grow as a community—whether in our classroom, workplace or family.

Encounter Christyan

Christyan DhathCroos is from a farming village in Sri Lanka, but he spent half of his life in India. He and his family fled there during Sri Lanka's civil war. He was only 14 years old when they left. When he returned to his homeland 16 years later, Christyan was 30, and the family farm was in shambles. He and his father found their fields covered in trees and filled with rocks. Now with a wife and family to provide for, Christyan needed help.

For a refugee, returning home after so many years can be challenging. That's why CRS is helping Christyan and others like him rebuild their lives. That means helping to clear overgrown sections of farmland and ensuring those farms have access to water. Christyan is now growing rice, pumpkin and peanuts. Because of the assistance from CRS, Christyan can give his family things he never had.

Things like education. Because his family was always fleeing violence during the war, Christyan never completed school. "I want to make sure my three children are educated," he says. "That's my dream. No one in our family has finished their education, but I know my children will."

Christyan's dream is coming true. With the profits from the family's farm, Christyan can send his 4-year-old son, Godwin, to a private Catholic preschool. It's worth the money to Christyan to help Godwin achieve his dream of becoming a scientist.

Christyan isn't just teaching his family that they can achieve their dreams with the help of a good education—he's also making sure they understand the importance of helping others. "When we had nothing, CRS came and helped us, and now we have what we need. We should help others too."

- As Sri Lanka continues to recover from a decades-long civil war and the devastating effects of recurrent natural disasters, including the 2004 tsunami, CRS has focused on rebuilding and helping those displaced after the war.
- CRS' Puthiya Vidiyal, or "New Dawn" project, supports safe and dignified lives for families who have returned to Sri Lanka after living in camps in Tamil Nadu, India, by strengthening agriculture livelihoods, training in employable skills, reducing violence and obtaining civil documents.
- Through Caritas, CRS sponsors the National Peace Program, designed to bring people together from across ethnic and religious divides to ease tensions that were the roots of the civil war.

Cows Against Malaria Project was set up three years ago to raise funds to fight the plague of malaria, a deadly disease common in tropical areas around the world, especially among the poor and rural people of eastern Africa. On medical missionary trips to Uganda, Deacon Don Grossnickle (from Our Lady of the Wayside) witnessed the suffering and death of infants and new mothers vulnerable to malaria, and other diseases, but who lacked even basic prenatal and neonatal healthcare. While medication for treatment of malaria is available, it is costly, and not available through the Ugandan government. Only the affluent there have access to this medication. Malaria is the leading cause of death in Uganda, accounting for over 27% of deaths. Uganda has the world's highest malaria incidence, with a rate of 478 cases per 1,000 population per year.

Cows Against Malaria is a project of Microfinance Alliance Africa Projects Foundation (a 501c3) whose mission is to save lives and promote the health and wellness of poor villagers, especially babies and mothers, in Uganda and other East African nations most vulnerable to the deadly disease of malaria. MAAPF raises funds here, and then provides grants and loans to parishes in various dioceses in Uganda for a variety of sustainable solutions and projects to fight malaria and conditions that strike babies and their mothers. Many MAAPF projects provide for the use of livestock and farming to build sustainability. Ultimately, these projects provide medicine and basic equipment for small, storefront clinics that save lives.

One project model creates a network of mini family-owned dairy farms with training, direction, and the loan of a pregnant heifer. Each cohort family commits to giving back the first female calf born to their cow, and makes an additional commitment to tithe back 10% of their milk proceeds for a small clinic to provide malaria medication and basic healthcare services, as well as prenatal and pediatric services to mothers and children of the village. The cost of each cow, plus training and support service for each recipient family is \$800. Currently three cohorts have been funded by donations to **CAMP**.

Another malaria clinic for mothers and children in Nakifuma, Uganda, benefitted directly from alms donated by St. Raymond de Penafort Parish during Lent 2018. The St. Raymond alms provided that clinic staff with a piggery, the proceeds of which now supplies malaria medication for the families they serve.

Our St. Raymond Lenten almsgiving for the weekends of **March 31**, **April 7**, **and April 14**, **2019** will go toward providing the training, direction, and livestock needed for the next **Cows Against Malaria** cohorts, and resources for other life-saving projects being planned.

Dear People of St. Raymond,

In Fall 2016, I began my diaconal journey. In May, I will have completed three years, with one to go before ordination! Also, I have come to realize that not all of our parish community is aware that I am on the diaconal path, and I thought it would be good to update you on my involvements.

My formation at the Institute of Diaconal Studies, in conjunction with University of St. Mary of the Lake in Mundelein, IL, has been enrichening and very rewarding. Courses cover such topics as Church History, Sacramental Theology, Old and New Testament, Ecclesiology, Christology, Sacramental Theology and Moral Theology. I look back on the previous years, and one class in particular that stood out for me was Catechism of the Catholic Church. Vatican II was still somewhat new when I was going through elementary school, and I feel that many Catholics from my generation don't know their catechism very well, and thus, the beliefs and morals of our Catholic faith. I hope to share this with our parish community over the coming years, perhaps in a focused study, but also in future homilies.



In addition to my coursework, I have taken on new and different roles at St. Raymond, and stepped down from some old ones, such as Lector and Extraordinary Minister of Holy Communion (both layperson roles). You may have seen me serving at the altar alongside our excellent young servers as **Acolyte**, the second of two benchmark roles toward the ordination path; the first step was as an **Instituted Reader**. You may have seen me offer a reflection after the Gospel, or lead a Communion Service, or lead Rosary after mass some weekday morning. These are all part of my internship requirements and will continue after ordination. Throughout all of my studies, Fr. Ed, Fr. Gilbert, Deacon Lorbach and Deacon Babczak have been a tremendous support to me, and my wife, Susan, has been my partner every step of the way! I wouldn't dream of proceeding unless Susan was behind me 100 %, and she is! And so many of you, the dynamic people of St. Raymond, have offered me well wishes and prayers, support and encouragement. My deepest gratitude!

I ask for your continual prayer as I journey forward, and know that I pray for you, especially at this holy season of Lent. If you have any questions about my diaconate, please feel free to ask!







The Seamless Garment Ministry has some very important information to share with you...

There are two very aggressive and extreme bills being introduced in Illinois's General Assembly. If these laws pass it will be a devastating blow to our State and Country. No one stands to gain anything from these - they are not going to protect children, families, parents and most of all women. Please take a few minutes to read the following info.

Laws HB 2467: Parent Notice Abortion Repeal and HB 2495: Reproductive Health Act are being introduced into our General Assembly and will likely pass unless we as Catholics who respect life make a stand. Both these laws will cancel the current laws our state has to protect life and families.

Here's what these bills will do:

- 1. Remove all limits on late-term abortions. Abortion, up to the moment of birth, for any reason or no reason at all, will be allowed
- 2. Remove any parental involvement in an underage girl's abortion
- 3. Remove all licensing requirements and health and safety standards for abortion clinics, including lateterm abortion clinics
- 4. Allow non-doctors to perform abortions and allow women to obtain abortion pills (medical abortions) without a physician's prescription
- 5. Force all insurance plans to cover abortions, with no exception for churches, religious organizations, or pro-life groups.
- 6. Expressly declare that the unborn child has no rights.
- 7. Remove conscience protections from pro-life doctors, nurses, and hospitals who refuse to participate in abortions.
- 8. Eliminate the requirement that abortion numbers be reported publicly, so that the additional number of abortions, or the number of abortions done on outof-state women or underage girls, will not be made public

Here's what you can do:
