

Memorial Day Mass 9:00 AM Monday, May 27, 2019 St. Raymond Parishioners,

During Easter week, about one-month ago, I had the opportunity to travel with a group of Diocesan priests to El Paso, Texas, at the southern border of the United States. This was sponsored by the Extension Society, which has a prominent footprint in the region (and throughout the U.S) to support catholic communities that are financially poor and face difficult issues. Our purpose was to visit different communities in the area, to witness how they continue to live and support each other in faith. Specifically, we were to view first-hand the plight of migrants who have come through the border. This issue is relatively divisive from the perspective of how it is presented through media outlets, the way it is discussed in public forum, and through various political agencies and personalities. My sharing is to help bring to light what we experienced and what the Catholic Church is doing to help.

First, the term "migrant" is used as a common term for any traveler seeking refuge. This is not the same as migrant workers who work the land from one season to another, from one state to the next. Many of us are aware that we live in a land with laws and governance to secure our borders, which is both important and vital to organization and security. The reality is that there is a massive group of people coming not only to our southern border, but from all others as well.

Second, many people crossing the southern border from Texas through California, many of whom are not residents of Mexico. According to border security policies, these people have a different process all together. Most of the people (migrants) are young parents with children coming from Central American countries, primarily El Salvador, Nicaragua, Guatemala, Ecuador and even Brazil. They are coming because life in their native lands is difficult. Many are being extorted, kidnapped, threatened and mired by an on-going culture of intimidation and violence through gangs. Roughly, 2,000+ people are coming weekly through the border (El Paso area) seeking asylum since October. I know that some people, including our president, has called this an invasion, and has used language describing people as "undesirable criminals." I did not see that in the places I visited. Hence, I find his language and that of others not representative of the facts and inciting fear and vigilantism. Moreover, I think the proper term to understand these events is **exodus**, a large group of people leaving their native lands for something better, whatever that may be. A journey to a better life to be free, and they are taking great risks. They are requesting asylum, and many will not receive it. This is a humanitarian crisis, it will continue in years to come, and will continue all over the globe. We have seen these mass migrations before in Europe and in Asia.

The big question: Why are they leaving? The research surrounding these events, and the practical knowledge of the rapid movement of globalized economies, has led to deserts of poverty (instability, corruption, lack of employment, or inability to support one's family), and many young people turning to gangs that extort and threaten local communities. There are several reasons for this, but at an alarming rate, people are getting up and moving away from their lands (their homes) because of lack of opportunity, hope, and ability of protecting loved ones. Truly, this is a humanitarian crisis.

In the midst of this, the church, specifically the Roman Catholic church guided by women religious, lay people and priests, is responding to their needs to feed, shelter and clothe, and provide a way station of hope and dignity to their next destination. Interestingly enough, after a migrant is detained, fitted with a GPS tracker, given a court date in some city in the U.S., they are merely dropped off in the street to get to a place like Providence, Rhode Island, Chicago, Tennessee or Virginia without language skills or basic means, a dire situation.

A federal hearing can take place, but they have no legal representation or way of getting to the hearing. What do they do? In the facilities we visited, the migrants are fed and supported and try to make contact with relatives who may live where the court hearing is scheduled. The volunteers from local churches, seminarians and throughout the region care for their basic needs and try to unite, connect, and give the best assistance to the next step. There is hope! However, as I write this a 5th child has died in federal detention, this one from the flu. Detention can last a month or more depending on circumstances and they are heavily overcrowded.

For me, the real drama of Christian faith is visible in the witnessing of people who walk with their children miles and miles, and trusting in God amidst great adversity; and the people who respond by witnessing with hands and hearts of mercy and compassion, who enfold each other as brothers and sisters in Jesus. As a parish, we are working to make a contribution to help support two of these centers. These centers are also open to volunteers to come down and spend a week or two helping.



What Is Domestic Violence? Any act carried out with the intention of physically or emotionally harming another person who is related to you by blood; present or prior marriage or common law marriage; having (or allegedly having) a child in common; having (or have had) a dating relationship. This also includes a person with a disability and their personal assistant.

Incorporated in 1981, **Family Rescue** has been a leader in the field by consistently providing progressive services to survivors of domestic violence for over thirty years.

Family Rescue maintains two family shelters specifically for domestic violence survivors in Chicago and surrounding areas. Theirs is the first program of its kind in the nation to provide **supportive housing** specifically designed for survivors of domestic violence. Their **Community Outreach Program** provides for the need for **counseling outside of shelter** and the need for **community education and prevention** about domestic violence issues. Family Rescue has been providing **legal advocacy services** since opening their doors. They are the only domestic violence agency in the city with a consistent presence in a Chicago Police District, civil court, and both misdemeanor and felony courts through its Legal Advocacy Program.

Family Rescue currently serves survivors throughout the Chicago metropolitan area via these four core programs with a multiplicity of services and linkages. Because they believe a woman is her own best advocate, Family Rescue responds to requests from clients and community members alike to provide the services they need. Since its founding to the present, Family Rescue has consistently responded to the growing and changing needs of the survivors of domestic violence they serve.

Our alms donations for the weekends of **May 18<sup>th</sup>/19<sup>th</sup>, 25<sup>th</sup>/26<sup>th</sup>, and June 1<sup>st</sup>/2<sup>nd</sup>, to Family Rescue will enable them to provide specialized daycare for children traumatized by domestic violence, safe shelter and meals for families fleeing violence, and, therapy for traumatized children who witness domestic violence.**
