Dear St. Raymond Parishioners,

Over the last few months, I hear many people ask, "When will summer arrive?" Often, this phrase attunes one to a chronological moment of better weather and better times. It signals a time of outdoor activities, picnics, vacations, and a more leisurely pace of life. However, while summer does arrive we often find ourselves disengaging on one level, and re-engaging to another. We still find ourselves busy, and though not as much, for many of us we fill our lives within a fluid stream of a hectic activity. So the question I ask you: what will you do with different this summer? Will we really rest? Truthfully, none of us can disengage completely from our responsibilities and work commitments, yet how do we cultivate a climate of relaxation and find time to re-energize and rest?

Interestingly, a book I read a few years back by Walter Brueggemann, titled *Sabbath as Resistance*, presented a religious spiritual value amidst a stark contemporary ailment: Sabbath rest is intended and *needed* for deepening and growing in life. Our Judeo-Christian tradition is grounded upon a day of rest that seeks to energize, connect, acknowledge the good, see the beauty in the moment, and bless each other. The spiritual value behind Sabbath rest was not simply to be restrictive with laws, which was one way of interpretation in our past society, but rather to use our freedom to be more creative with life, our families, and our communities. The premise of the book states that we should assimilate Sabbath rest (Sunday) so as to resist the temptations of contemporary life that unassumingly are destructive and numbing our capacity to rest and grow.

Why is this important? Our contemporary context for the most part is driven by a rat-race (sorry rats) anxiety, which is defined by production and consumption of goods. We are surrounded by a barrage of seductive pressures from the market that intrudes into everyday life to achieve, perform and possess. We want more, to own more and to eat more, as we face the demanding, chattering presence of advertising and the great claim of "sports" to devour our "rest time" and souls. Perhaps this may sound negative, but when you examine our use of time, where we place our energy, very little is dedicated to the restoration of our own souls and our communities. Sabbath rest is an alternative offer as the awareness and practice of the assertion of the spirit that we are on the receiving end of the gifts of God.

Here are some common areas where it is hard to receive the gifts of God based on our behavior and intentions: the place of idolatry in our culture - the state of anxiety and restlessness - the behavior of coercion and violence (force and domination) - the common practice of multitasking - the practice of coveting. In all these examples is the strong intention and action of self-promotion and initiation. There is very little room to allow reception and thanksgiving to find a home.

Perhaps that is the most defining issue that this presents for us in our reflection and action: we are often on the initiating end of things. Our society is so constructed to meet the needs of the commodity-driven environment that specializes in control, entertainment, and food, along with anxiety and manipulation.

Perhaps we cannot do much about this current state of the world, however, Jesus gives us an alternative. The community of Jesus invites us to a world where gifts are given! Our spiritual/religious life is centered around the "gift" of God given to us in creation. Yes, it is a gift! Our sacramental language dares us to visualize this gift in the Eucharist, meaning thanksgiving. How great is that! We are grateful for the gift. To us, who may be burdened and weary, slowed down with a load of care for others, or preoccupied with tomorrow's daily bread, our tradition speaks of a peaceable alternative. Happy Father's Day Have a great summer!

Our program offers assistance in adapting to a new environment for up to two years, providing a variety of services, including:

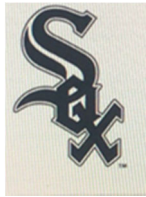
- Securing housing and providing food, clothing, and household items;

Some financial news to share. As you may have noticed that our overall collections have been down over the past year. This is similar but not the same as previous years. On the other hand, our actual uses and expenditures are down and this is not reflected in the \$110,000.00. For the next few weeks until June 30, 2019, we will be accepting donations for a catch-up campaign to close the gap and to end in a better position fiscally. We need up to \$75,000 to "catch-up" to meet our fiscal goals. The more important news to share were are in a much better financial picture then last year. This will be shared with you in autumn. 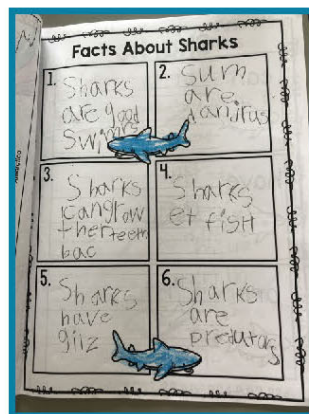
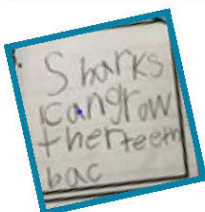
Kindergarten Marine Biologists

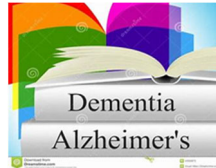
