Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

The day of Pentecost is often considered the birth of the Church. The risen and ascended Jesus gave the Holy Spirit to the first disciples to empower them for mission. On that day, as a sign of the universal reach of the mission, the Spirit enables the preaching of the gospel to be heard for the first time in all languages. The giving of Spirit continues today through the anointing's of baptism and confirmation. The gifts of the Spirit enable all disciples to play a part in the Church's mission of healing and renewal.

It is fitting today, on Pentecost, that we start to look at the multi-phased plan for reopening parishes within the Archdiocese of Chicago. This is a gradual plan that is recognizes the need to balance the health and safety of each person along with their spiritual wellbeing. There are currently three phases as outlined by the Archdiocese of Chicago:

- •Phase I allows for parishes to reopen for Baptism, Reconciliation, Weddings, and Funerals with a limit of 10 attendees.
- •Phase IA allows for parishes to reopen for private prayer and adoration with a limit of 10 attendees.
- •Phase II allows for reopening for weekday and weekend Masses for larger groups depending on the guidelines from the state and the capacity of the church building.

Currently churches may focus on Phase I and Phase IA. Within this phased reopening plan the Archdiocese is providing strict guidelines, developed in collaboration with industry and healthcare experts. A parish must adhere to attendee guidelines, disinfecting protocols and sacramental procedures to receive the Archdiocese of Chicago certification. This certification is needed to be able to offer sacraments and private prayer at St. Raymond Parish.

The next page is a brief summary to outline Phase 1 and 1A reopening potential for churches within the Archdiocese.

The health and safety of our parishioners remain our highest priority as we move forward in developing our St. Raymond Parish plan. The Archdiocese of Chicago requested to have parishes assemble a Leadership Team. The St. Raymond's Leadership Team has been created with both staff and parishioners. This team has attended the required training sessions last week, given by the Archdiocese of Chicago to further explain implementation of guidelines. The team has already begun to outline the tasks, action steps, and volunteer recruitment/training needed to complete the certification process, required by the Archdiocese, to be able to reopen for Phase I and Phase IA. This is quite an undertaking and I am grateful for all that they are doing to move the certification process forward.

While the team is working on this plan, we will not reopen until the leadership team, staff, and volunteers are confident in our ability to execute the plan to ensure the safety of all entering the facilities. We are moving as quickly as possible while ensuring that procedures are set in place to help mitigate the spread of the virus. Yet, it is important to note that currently Cook County still is a hot spot for cases and the situation "remains dangerous and fragile". We cannot guarantee our efforts will ultimately prevent the spread of the virus. It will be up to each person to weigh the risks and required measures for your participation as you consider returning to partake in private prayer or the sacraments.

We are anticipating that we will be able to roll out our parish specific plan by Sunday, May 31, as the shelter-in-place order is lifted. Further information will be sent through email, posted on social media and available on the website (www.st-raymond.org). Also, the front office will be available to answer your calls office Monday-Friday at 847-253-8600 between the hours of 8:30 a.m. – noon.

All of us on Leadership Team thank you for your committed patience as together we navigate through the pandemic to bring you the opportunities to reenter the Church. On the Feast of Pentecost, may we continue to focus the hope that Christ brings to each of us. May we remain committed and united through our prayers for one another, the Church, and the world.



SnapChat, TikTok, HouseParty... before you have time to view and approve, the next social media app is out. Technology at our fingertips is ever-changing.

This spring/summer, we are highlighting some of the apps that your kiddos may be asking about, or have already downloaded.

The majority of apps are okay and safe to use (of course, not ALL apps), but the best way to be in control of the safety features is monitoring the devices.

Let's dig a bit into SnapChat:



This one is very popular! Known for its fun, goofy filters (because, who doesn't want to have glittery puppy ears and tongue?), and ability to "snap" a picture to a friend, this app is fun, and does not save chats or conversations... unless the user or recipient chooses to.

Let me explain: the app notifies the profile owner if someone took a screenshot, a screen recording of his/her story, chat, or shared photo, or saved a photo or conversation in the chat box.

Keeping our youth safe...

- +Take a look: this app not only offers the ability to store photos, but also to save private photos with a passcode in order to view (under "My Eyes Only")
- +In settings, check out "Who Can":
- -Contact Me (My Friends or Everyone... everyone means EVERYONE in the world)
- -View My Story (My Friends, Everyone, or Custom... ability to block individuals from viewing)
- -See My Location (so many options, but "Ghost Mode" is your safest selection)
- -See Me in Quick Add (suggests mutual friends this can be awkward when a friend's aunt/uncle requests after meeting them a few times)

Reminder: the keys to safety is monitoring the devices and keeping an open conversation, especially about feelings and emotions. If the child/youth ever feels uncomfortable with something they see or hear, they should be able to tell a trusted adult.


Do as much or as little as you want – if your kids like some activities they can do them several times.

Coming together with Technology





A message from Deacon John Lorbach

Dear Friends.

Rather than beginning this message to you with the usual generic statement... "I hope you are doing well!" today I prefer a more blunt approach. "How are YOU doing?"

"How are YOU doing?" goes right to the heart of it with our lives enduring a deadly pandemic that has shut down our world, locked us in, and impacted our economy; our businesses and our jobs. We fear for our loved ones, along with fearing for our own well-being and health, as well.

So, "How are YOU doing?" at this very moment, as we move from week to week and day to day, safe and secure in our homes. We've endured this extreme action long enough to have begun a new routine to make it through the day. If you are like me, you get excited hearing the medical experts tell us it appears as if this effort is helping to flatten that curve. And if you are like me, you, too, are longing to hear the words of being set free again, and of returning back into the world to begin to pick up the pieces and return to a normal way of life again. But then reality sets in as we realize we still have a long way to go before victory over this dangerous virus can be claimed. Until then we need to ask each other that blunt question, "How are YOU doing?"

Like many of you, I have been fortunate to have been able to bring my workspace into my home and continue to work from here. When I am not at the computer, I tackle the household chores, cleaned out every closet in the house, and baked far too many loaves of bread, cakes and cookies. I have dedicated this month of April to creating 30 different ways to make jello. So far, April 7th was my favorite. I never would have thought that lemon jello and chocolate chips could taste so good, but I do now, thanks to being sheltered-in 24/7.

I suppose if anyone asked me that blunt question, I would say I am doing very well, but all that busyness that I created for myself is not what helps me stay grounded and hopeful during this pandemic. It was heeding some good advice to live these days like a monk answering the bell to prayer throughout the day; to drop whatever I am doing and make that prayer time the very center of my day, then filling in the rest of the day with work and activities.

As a member of the Catholic clergy, I made a vow at my ordination to pray the liturgical hours of the Church. It is no secret that is easier said than done at times. It takes old fashion discipline and many nights when I nod off in the middle of the prayer. I bet many of you might follow this same practice of joining voices around the world, as we praise God in the universal prayer of the Church. If not, I encourage you to live around your own prayer bells, by leaving the computer or whatever task you are doing and dedicate certain times of your day to prayer.

Our prayer need not be a formal prayer. And we do not need to be sitting in a pew to make it happen; a comfortable chair in a favorite quiet spot or even a bench outdoors on nice days works, too. And why not make your prayer a conversation between you and our loving God. Offer your list, your needs and concerns to God. Of course, include those who are suffering and dying, along with those brave people in the medical field and the essential workers who are doing everything they can to help us live and stay nourished and safe. And don't forget that a conversation is a two-way street. We need to stop and listen to God speak to our hearts. Sometimes God speaks to us through a sunset or the sweet chirping of a little bird, perched high in a tree. We might miss that if we ignore that prayer bell to silent and still ourselves before we return to that computer again.

Corrie ten Boom, a faith-filled Dutch woman, who suddenly found herself facing concentration camp during World War II, once asked, "Is prayer your steering wheel or your spare tire?" Is prayer the center or core, from which all of life flows? Is it like your steering wheel that moves you forward as you firmly grasp it with both hands? Or is prayer like a spare tire, hopefully, tucked away somewhere in the back of the car in the event you might one day need it?

I have a feeling those monks discovered a great secret with that prayer bell. As Mikey used to say in that TV commercial, "Try it, you'll like it!!" How ironic (and yes, I know, a pun) that he was speaking about a cereal called "Life!" just as those times of dedicated prayer will help center our lives too. It will help us to respond, without hesitation, the next time someone asks us "How are YOU doing?"






