Keynote: Sr. Paesie

Founder, The Kizito Family

Born in Nancy, France, Sister Paesie (Claire Joelle Philippe) grew up in a large, faith-filled family and first sensed a call to religious life as a child. Inspired by the life and witness of Mother Teresa, she joined the Missionaries of Charity on her 18th birthday and took her final vows in 1996. Her formation and missionary work took her across Europe and eventually to Haiti in 1999, where she served for nearly two decades among the poorest of the poor.

Over time, Sister felt a new calling—one that led her to found The Kizito Family in 2018, a Catholic community dedicated to protecting, educating, and evangelizing street children in Port-au-Prince. Named after St. Kizito, a 14-year-old Ugandan martyr, the community works in neighborhoods marked by extreme violence and poverty, offering free schools, safe shelters, and spiritual care to hundreds of children and youth.

Sister Paesie continues to live and serve among the most vulnerable, witnessing to the power of love in action. Her life reminds us that true service is not just what we do—it's who we become when we follow Christ to the margins.

He enjoys farming in his free time.



Sr. Stephanie Baliga

Member of the Franciscans of the Eucharist of Chicago. She has a BA in economics and geography from University of Illinois in Urbana Champaign, a Master of Arts in Pastoral Studies from University of St. Mary of the Lake, and Masters in Teaching from Dominican University. She spends most of her time moving people, resources, and money in and out of Mission of Our Lady of the Angels to help support over 4000 families a month with food and other basic needs. She spearheads "Team OLA" in the Chicago Marathon that has raised over \$2,000,000 to support the Mission. She teaches K-8 religion at St. Sylvester School part time. The Eucharist was the center of her conversion and remains the center of her life.

Blanca Rodriguez serves as the Youth and Young Adult Coordinator for the Respect Life Office at the Archdiocese of Chicago and works as a mental health therapist at Vita Optimum Counseling, a Catholic private practice. As a first-generation Latina, she is passionate about the intersection of culture, faith, and mental health, and how these shape the decisions and values that form our lives. She holds a Bachelor of Arts in Psychology and a Master's in Clinical Mental Health Counseling.

She recently completed her term coordinating the JP2 Community in Little Village and continues to serve in ministry by facilitating Theology of the Body courses for young adults across the Chicagoland area. She is deeply committed to walking with mothers in need and upholding the dignity of every human life, Blanca also supports post-abortion healing efforts, partners with women's centers, and helps organize March for Life events. Outside of ministry, Blanca loves dancing, cherishes intentional time with family and friends, and is joyfully preparing for her wedding this year!





Fr. Leandro Fossa, C.S., is a Brazilian-born priest of the Missionaries of St. Charles (Scalabrinians), a congregation dedicated to the pastoral care of migrants and refugees. Ordained in 2011, he has served diverse communities across the United States, including ministries in Maryland and California. Fluent in Portuguese, Spanish, English, and Italian, Fr. Fossa is known for his inclusive and compassionate approach to ministry. His outreach extends to marginalized populations, such as migrant workers and carnival employees, earning him the affectionate nickname "the carnie priest." Currently, he continues his mission of accompanying migrants and fostering inclusive communities, embodying the Scalabrinian charism of serving those on the move.

Keynote: Alan Graham

Founder & CEO, Mobile Loaves & Fishes

Alan Graham is the founder and CEO of Mobile Loaves & Fishes (MLF), a social outreach ministry based in Austin, Texas, dedicated to providing permanent, dignified solutions to chronic homelessness. Since 1998, MLF has served over 6 million meals to individuals living on the streets and built a powerful movement rooted in love, community, and radical hospitality.

Alan is also the visionary behind Community First! Village, a 51-acre master-planned development that offers affordable housing and a supportive

environment to those who have long struggled with homelessness. With more than 20,000 volunteers engaged, MLF is now the largest prepared feeding program for the homeless in Austin and has inspired similar ministries nationwide.

Before founding MLF, Alan worked in real estate development, leading projects across the U.S. He credits much of MLF's growth to the guidance of those he met on the streets, especially a formerly homeless man named Houston Flake, who helped shape the ministry's successful model.

Alan and his wife, Tricia, have been married since 1984 and have four children and a niece they helped raise. His book, Welcome Homeless: One Man's Journey of Discovering the Meaning of Home, captures his personal and spiritual transformation through this work.

Alan's story is a testament to what happens when faith meets action—and when community becomes the cure to homelessness.

Cindy Esparza: Concert & Adoration

Evangelizer & Catholic Music Minister

Cindy Esparza, a dentist from Monterrey, Mexico, is devoted not only to caring for smiles but also to sharing the joy of the Gospel. Her true passion lies in evangelization—through music, teaching, and digital media.

For the past two years, she has taught Christian Life Principles and Values at the University of Monterrey (UDEM), while also serving as a retreat guide and Extraordinary Minister of Communion. With over a decade of experience in ministry and a strong digital presence since 2018, Cindy uses music to bring Jesus' message of peace and hope to a wider audience.

Today, she dedicates herself full time to the mission, continuing to inspire others with her faith and joyful witness.

Keynote: Dr. Michael J. Naughton

Director, Center for Catholic Studies, University of St. Thomas

Dr. Michael Naughton is the director of the Center for Catholic Studies at the University of St. Thomas (Minnesota, US) where he holds the Koch Chair in Catholic Studies and is a full professor in the department of Catholic Studies. He also taught in the College of Business for over 20 years. Author, co-author and co-editor of 12 books and monographs and over 60 articles, his most recent book is What We Hold in Trust: Rediscovering the Purpose of Catholic Higher Education (2021). He serves on multiple boards including as board chair for Reell Precision Manufacturing, which has plants and offices in the US, Europe and Asia and the board of trustees at the University of Mary and Catholic Eldercare.

Christina Lamas has served as Executive Director of the National Federation for Catholic Youth Ministry (NFCYM) since 2016, bringing over 25 years of experience in Catholic ministry. She began as a parish volunteer and has since held leadership roles at parish, archdiocesan, and national levels.

A graduate of the University of Southern California with degrees in psychology and social work, Christina previously served as Associate Director for the Office of Religious Education in the Archdiocese of Los Angeles. Her passion lies in forming leaders and empowering young people in their faith.

She currently serves on several national boards, including Catholic Relief Services, the Leadership Roundtable, CARA, NCEA, and SEPI.



José González

Known as "El Profe," José Cruz González is a seminarian for the Archdiocese of Chicago, having entered formation in 2022. A second-generation Mexican-American born on Chicago's southwest side, he holds a degree in Graphic Design and later pursued studies in Education and Special Education. Before seminary, he spent four years supporting students with disabilities at a therapeutic day school.

Though raised Catholic, José left the Church in 2008 and later returned in 2019—an experience that reignited his faith and led him to join Iskali. There, he found a community that helped deepen his relationship with God and clarify his call to the priesthood. Today, he continues his formation with a heart for service, hoping to one day serve the people of God with compassion and humility.



Mireya Guzmán

Mireya works as a Senior Financial Analyst at CRG, a Real Estate Development and Investment firm where she is responsible for supporting regional offices, the capital markets group, and senior leadership with financial analysis of new and existing development projects and analysis of the consolidated CRG platform. Prior to joining CRG, Mireya was a Portfolio Manager for Wintrust Bank in Chicago, where she actively managed a commercial real estate loan portfolio totaling ~\$1.3 billion in loan commitments secured by various asset types located across distinct U.S. markets.

She is also the founding anchor of the weekly show News in Depth.

Profiled by the Wall Street Journal as "A defender of all religion, on the front lines of America's culture wars," she worked with the team at the Becket Fund for Religious Liberty—a renowned non-profit defending religious freedom as a human right—for 14 years, securing 12 victories at the Supreme Court for clients like the Little Sisters of the Poor.

Montse serves on the boards of various Catholic nonprofits and advises the U.S. Catholic Bishops through their Religious Liberty Committee.

A respected teacher and speaker, he also forms Spanish-speaking leaders and deacon candidates through the Instituto de Liderazgo Pastoral.

In addition to his work with Iskali, Vicente is a keynote speaker and has addressed audiences in National Catholic conferences and esteemed institutions such as Georgetown University, Boston College, University of Notre Dame, and others.
